formulated prior to the said amendment of February 11 this year.

"The present decree goes into effect three days after its publication in the Official Diary of the Federation.

"In compliance with the fulfillment of Section I of Article 70 of the Political Constitution of the Mexican United States by due publication and decree, I promulgate the present decree at the residence of the Federal Executive in Mexico City on the twenty-fifth day of the month of June, one thousand nine hundred thirty-five."

Further information has come to light regarding the situation in the State of Colima with respect to the abrogation of persecutory laws in that state. A previous report that priests would be allowed to return to Colima and that all churches would be allowed to re-open for services had been denied. Now it is learned that the Colima Legislature has issued a decree declaring freedom of worship throughout the State leaving the former law which provided absolute restriction of worship without effect. Colima is one of the States where no priests are licensed to officiate and no churches are allowed to be open. However, this action was taken in the absence of the Governor, Salvador Saucedo, who upon learning of it hastened to leave Mexico City for the City of Colima to veto the decree.

City-Bred Priest's Success on Farm Seen Impetus to Back-to-Land Move

Montreal—(COW)—The success of Abbe Falardeau, city-bred pastor of St. Lucie, as a farmer has become an inspiration to those seeking a solution to the economic problem, and an impetus to the back-to-the-land movement, which is more and more coming to be regarded as one means of improving economic conditions in over-crowded cities.

Before going to St. Lucie, Abbe Falardeau had no agricultural experience or background, since his grandfather and father were bankers. The country in which his parish is situated is described as somewhat unfavorable to the most productive farming because of a late Spring and early Fall.

But Abbe Falardeau went to work. Knowing little about farming, he secured books on the subject and applied his own knowledge in this way. Applying his own knowledge, he set about the "ground work" until today his farm is considered a model-farm in surrounding countryside. Neighboring farmers, reared on the soil, have observed the priest's methods and have done likewise, with equally beneficial results.

The success of Abbe Falardeau, when fully revealed here, has served as a stimulus to the discussion of proposals to open up more land for city dwellers beset by economic difficulties. It is even being said that the priest's agricultural exploits may bring forth a back-to-the-land movement within a short time. It is believed that it will necessitate Mayor Carlisle Elmer's land reclamation policies, which the city believes hold the solution of the economic problem created about by over-populated areas.

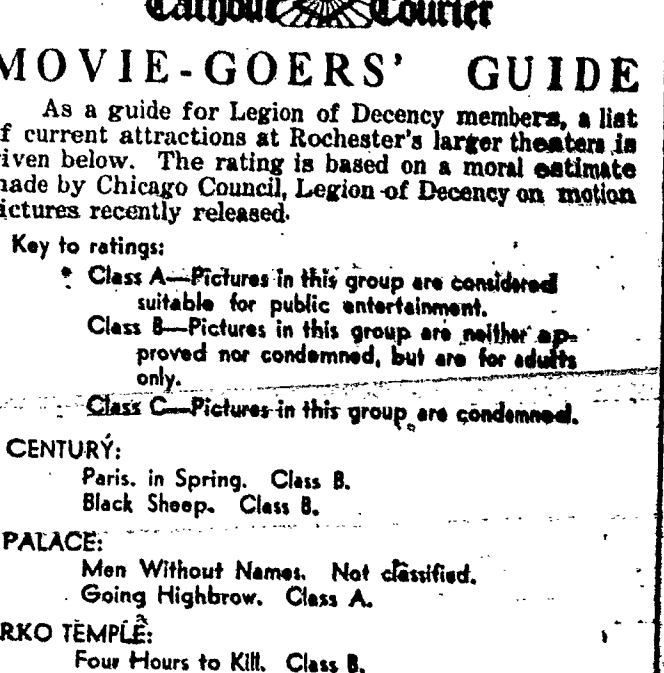
