The Papacy Relative Importance of St. Peter and St. Paul Peter died, but continued to live in the Office and Commission given him by the Redeemer. By no human means could the Papacy have come into being, or survive. To the people of pre-Reformation Europe the idea of a Church without the Pope would be as preposterous as that of a man without a head.

On Saturday, June 29, we celebrated the Feast of St. Peter and St. Paul, the two Apostles over whose heads the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven were given. His name occurs but once and that in the Collect of the Mass and in the prayer, which is identical with the Collect in the Divine Office. And, significant.

What we celebrate on June 29 is really the Supremacy of Peter among the Apostles, and the Supremacy of the See of Rome in the Constitution of the Church and its history. In the New Testament the figures of these two Apostles overshadow all the others by their importance. They also, and they alone among the Apostles, preached the Gospel to the Romans. Hence the Roman liturgy has inseparably linked their names together.

Authority Accepted But it is significant that Paul has no successor who at any subsequent time raises a claim to special authority in the Church, whereas St. Peter has successors. These successors claim to speak with "the voice of Peter," with the special authority conferred on Peter by Christ himself, and their voice is heard, their special authority is conceded by the whole Church, East and West.

If we want to speak solely of the relative importance of these two Apostles as manifested in the New Testament, it would seem that St. Paul should be given first place. He travels more, he founds more churches, he writes more Epistles, he has apparently more disciples. Yet he leaves no successor, and the Bishops whom he does appoint, such as Titus and Timothy, never after his death claim to speak with the voice of Paul, nor do their successors ever raise a claim of jurisdiction over other churches. How explain all this?

Do you suppose that such an institution as the Papacy could have been brought into being by any human means? Believe it not. Men are very much the same at all times and in all ages. They believe that they were fundamentally different in past ages from what they are today. They have always been divided into warring groups with special interests, with separate attachments to their own opinions, philosophies and social systems, with national and racial prejudices for which they will die. How unite these kill their opponents.

Without Brute Force The only means by which they have ever been brought into an apparent unity and held together is by the force of the Roman Empire. In an example. There are many others. And so soon as the brute force collapsed the bonds of unity were dissolved. It was always so, and it is so today. To bring it you can only go to the League of Nations, the Disarmament Conference, the World War and its aftermath. Only one institution has functioned throughout the ages and survives today as an exception to that universal rule and this institution has never had nor has today, the means of brute force to hold its subjects together in unity. Yet this unity is greater and more enduring than any ever accomplished by brute force. That institution is the Papacy.

The reason is plain. Christ established a Church to carry His Gospel to all men for all time. He spoke of it under many metaphors. He called it a Kingdom, a fold, a house built upon a rock. Under all these metaphors, two ideas are insisted on unity and stability. There is nothing more definite in the Gospel narrative than that he selected Peter to be the head of that Church, and that on Peter He conferred the Supreme Authority and promised the Divine assistance to ensure that unity and stability. After Peter's three repeated profession of faith in his Master's Divinity, Christ said to him: "And I say to thee: Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church, and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it."

Giuseppe Vare, Foster Brother of Pope, Dies

Vatican City (NCWC) Giuseppe Vare, foster brother of His Holiness Pope Pius XI, has died at Desio, the birthplace of the Pope, on the age of 78. When Monsignor Ratti was appointed Archbishop of Milan, persons who congratulated his foster brother heard him reply: "He has not yet finished his career." Six months later Achille Ratti ascended the chair of St. Peter. On that occasion, a journalist asked Signor Vare what he thought of it, and the latter, who was by trade a cobler, answered: "I am sorry I can no longer make him a pair of slippers of my own making, for now he will wear them made of silk and gold."

How and What To Serve Hints For the Housewife By MOLLY GAVIN

The carving of meat has much to do not only with its enjoyment and attractive appearance, but with its economical use. It is a wise idea to do all carving in the kitchen before the table is brought to the table. In carving, meat, always cut across the grain of the meat, never with the grain. Meat cut with the grain is stringy and tough.

A leg of lamb or mutton is considered many the most difficult piece of meat to carve. If the hip bone is removed, the carving of this piece is simple, but the hip bone is usually left in. Place the leg on a platter with the skin side next to the carver. Carve from the hip bone across the leg, these will be the largest slices as they come from the part of the joint which has most meat. The portions near the knuckle are to be cut in the same way they will not be so rare as the thicker slices.

To carve poultry, place the bird on the platter with the head to the left and the side toward the carver. Insert the fork across the center of the breast bone. Remove the wing then the leg, then the side bone between the leg and body. Cut slices from the breast, running from breastbone to place where wing was removed. Carve from the end of breast to the left of the wing joint. Make an incision to the right of breastbone for removing stuffing.

Practically every boy and girl like bananas, but do all the Junior Cooks know what delicious dishes can be made by combining bananas with a few simple ingredients. The following recipe was sent to me only a few days ago and I am sure you will be more than pleased with results if you just try it. It would make a delicious dessert for dinner or luncheon. Banana Cinnamon Toast Rounds of hot toast Sliced banana Butter Sugar Cinnamon Butter rounds or squares of toast, cover with slices of banana, sprinkle the tops with two parts of granulated sugar combined with one part cinnamon; drizzle to every 2 tbsps sugar add 1 tsp cinnamon. Place on a broiler or in a hot oven and heat until brown. Serve warm as a dessert for luncheon or dinner or afternoon tea. It can also be served for breakfast.

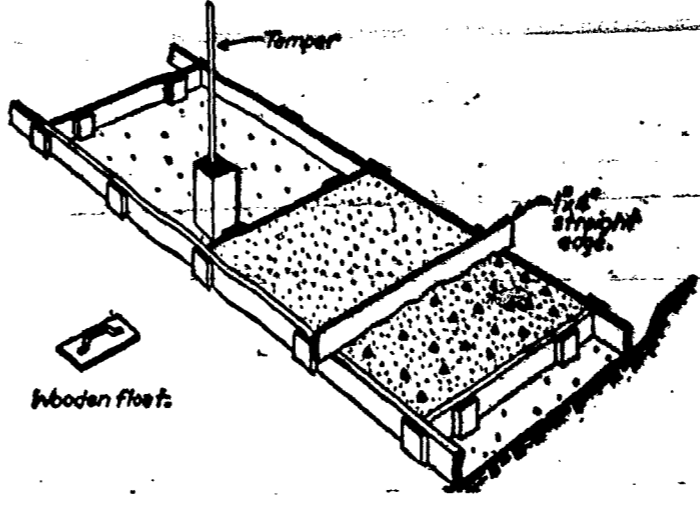

SIDEWALKS, PAVEMENTS AND FLOORS frequently used, as runways for light farm conveyances. Sidewalks should always rest on a firm base of well-drained ground that has been well compacted, or on a sub-base of well-compacted, clean, coarse gravel or clean cinders. Concrete walks between the different farm buildings are much appreciated in wet weather and are a walk, 4 inches is generally thick.

EUCCHARISTIC CONGRESS COMMITTEE GIVEN THREE FLOORS OF BUILDING

Cleveland (NCWC) The owners of the Guarantee Title Building here have donated the use of the first three floors of that structure as headquarters for the committee planning for the Seventh National Eucharistic Congress to be held here September 23 to 28. As the preparatory work for the National Eucharistic Congress, which is expected to be one of the most impressive demonstrations of faith in the history of the United States, has progressed, the growth of the committee made larger headquarters an acute necessity. The Chancery office became too small, and the expansion of Congress activities endangered the routine work of the Chancery.

The donation of three floors of the Guarantee Title Building solve the problem handsomely, officials say. The Congress activities, they point out, will have adequate headquarters space, and at the same time are in the same building with the regular diocesan offices. They are next door to the Cathedral, and within the relatively small area that will witness all of the Congress activities.

To facilitate publicity, the editorial offices of The Catholic Universe Bulletin will be transferred from the sixth floor of the Guarantee Title Building to the Congress headquarters and will remain there until the Congress ends. Large quarters are reserved on the first floor for the National Council of Catholic Women and for men and women's societies, their will participate in the Congress preliminaries. The spacious front offices on the mezzanine floor will serve the executive committee, and will be occupied by the Most Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland, and the Most Rev. James A. McFadden, Auxiliary Bishop of Cleveland, and the secretaries. Here also visiting members of the Hierarchy will be received and entertained.

On the same floor each committee chairman will have an individual office. There are larger rooms for full committee meetings and on the third floor a directors' room for merger meetings of all the committees. A private telephone exchange is being installed in the new quarters.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Wrap pie crust dough carefully in waxed paper so it will not dry out and you can keep it in the refrigerator for several days. If you line your cake pans with waxed paper, the cakes will not stick. Grease pans first, then fit the paper lining smoothly over the bottom and grease the paper. Pile meringue lightly over the top of a pie from the edge in, pushing it into each crinkle of the crust.

When you serve iced coffee, remember to make it double strength because the melting ice dilutes it.

enough; but if wagons or heavy vehicles are likely to drive over the concrete, 6 inches is the minimum thickness. Usually two by fours are used for side forms, being held in place by stakes driven along the outside. To ensure sure that water will drain off the walk, should be sloped toward one side. A pitch of 1/4 inch to 1/2 inch is satisfactory for a walk 3 feet wide. For convenience in building and to provide for expansion and contraction of joints, walks should be divided at 4 to 6 foot intervals with partition strips placed at right angles to the side form.
