Villanova Scholarship Winner Prepared Well At St. Joseph's, Aquinas

Raymond E. MacGregor, son of Mrs. Ella MacGregor of 104 Chestnut St., who was awarded the Aquinas Institute scholarship for Villanova College, was one of the ten key men singled out by Aquinas for special work and awarded a key for his excellent work in French.

During his four years at Aquinas young MacGregor has been each year on the honor roll and made a member of the St. Thomas Club for his high scholastic average and was elected a permanent member of the St. Thomas Club. He was the club editor of the school paper.

St. Bona Faculty Proficient With Pen, Books Show

A recent survey at St. Bonaventure College, Albany, N. Y., discloses that during the past several seasons members of the Faculty in addition to their regular conduct of classes, have occupied themselves actively in publishing books and writing articles for many magazines.

The Rev. Thomas Plassman, O. P. M., Ph.D., S.T.D., Litt. D., President of the College, has headed the list of publications, with a popular treatise on the Bible, entitled "The Book Called Holy."

The Rev. Valentine Long, O. P. M., M.A., Dean of the Department of English, has been the author of a well-received volume of religious and literary essays, "Not on Bread Alone," now in its second edition.

The Rev. Vincent J. M. M.A., has recently completed a critical textbook on Church History, shortly to be released from the press. Likewise now at press is a volume by the Rev. David Bauer, O. F. M., M.A., S.T.D., "Catholic Liturgics," an adaptation from the standard German work of Dr. Stapper, due it is expected, from the press sometime this fall.

"Stock Charges Against the Bible," a free adapt on from a popular German work of the same title and "Outlines of Rhetoric," a text for college freshmen, have been published by the Rev. Claude Kean, O. F. M., M.A., Chairman of the Department of Arts.

As a thesis for the degree of J. C. D., the Rev. Bartholomew Trimm, O. F. M., M.A., J. C. D., has written a scholarly work on "Matrimonial Consent."

The greatest activity however, has been evinced in the Science Department of the St. Bonaventure. In conjunction with Mr. John L. Worden, Associate Professor of Biology, the Rev. Hubert Voeccherello, O. F. M., M.A., Ph.D., Dean of the Department of Science, have recently published "A Textbook on Vertebrate Embryology."

A manual which consists of an explanatory text, plates, figures and 250 illustrations, most of which are original with the authors. The textbook has already been adopted by many leading universities and colleges in the East. In his own right, Fr. Voeccherello a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and many other veteran organizations, has likewise written and published during the past season, he rendered into English the Italian work of Marucci now entitled "Manual of Christian Archeology," a volume which is indispensable in the study of Christian Archeology. The volume contains over five hundred illustrations, all of which are taken from the original book. Fr. Voeccherello also edited a long series of Monographs, presenting the Catholic view of numerous scientific questions included among them are the following:

"The Virgin Birth of Jesus Christ," "Science and Philosophy," "Catholicism and Protestantism," "Science and Religion," "Life is a Mechanistic," "Mephistopheles," "The Fiction Fact or Fancy," "Evolution and Relativity," "LeMaitre and the Expanding Universe," and the "Plurality of Worlds."

Dodd, Ambassador of the United States, in an address delivered to night to a delegation from the Steuben Society of New York and its host, the Carl Schurz Society of Berlin.

Declaring that propaganda is "one of the errors of our time," Mr. Dodd said: "We must speak the truth to one another. The world must tell what happens everywhere so all peoples may profit from their work. Civilized mankind needs to be better informed so men may cooperate and not fight."

Tax Bills Effect On Gifts in Wills Stir Speculation

(Continued from Page One) this particular point of view. The House provisions make no increase in the estate tax in the passing of large fortunes but do include an inheritance tax. The Senate provisions, on the other hand, make no mention of an inheritance tax but provide for an increase in the estate tax.

Those who favor the House provisions contend that with no increase in the estate tax a larger amount will remain in the residuary estates of wealthy men, from which they contend, bequests are usually made to charitable works. Thus, they continue, with the residuary estate larger and with charitable institutions excluded from the obligation of paying an inheritance tax, the amount of money devolving upon charitable undertakings will be a consequence be larger.

The Senate provisions, on the other hand, contend that the matter will not work out this way in actual practice but that, with the inheritance tax included in the revenue which accrues to the benefactor, will accrue to charitable works.

That it is extremely difficult, if not impossible, to predict the real effect of either set of provisions is clear. Authority may from a consideration of the human element that enters into the making of wills and devising of property. Men measure, they point out, exercise the greatest care and consideration in drawing up their wills, and will weigh well every provision of the will and the particular effect of the provisions in the event of their passing.

The House provisions, it is pointed out, will shift part of the burden of taxation from the estate itself to the individual or group benefitting under the will. With this in mind, they continue, a man wishing his heirs to receive a particular amount will now designate not only that fixed amount, but also an added sum to take care of the surtax which the heir will have to pay as an inheritance tax. In the event of a large estate, the heir to have \$1,000,000 would, under this set of circumstances, leave his heir not \$1,000,000 even, but \$1,000,000 less the amount of the inheritance tax on that sum. The effect of this, they contend, will be to reduce the residuary estate just as effectively as does the inheritance tax, without the inheritance tax.

One provision which seems certain to be included in the final draft of the bill is that permitting corporations to make deductions, up to five per cent of their taxable incomes, for gifts made to charitable and religious works. Under existing law, individuals are permitted to make deductions up to 10 per cent of their taxable incomes for such charitable gifts. In the Revenue Act of 1934, however, there is no allowance made for similar deductions by corporations in computing their net taxable income.

AFRICA BIRHOP, JURILARIAN Limba, British Africa (NCWC) The Most Rev. 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1936 Will Prove Opportunity Year, Say Experts

Seldom have business observers been so nearly in agreement regarding the future of business as they have been in recent weeks. Month by month, reported gains in practically every industry have given substance to the belief that this fall and the succeeding months in 1935 will see a business upswing unprecedented in the history of this country.

Factors on which predictions have been based are freight and loadings, telephone installations, checks cashed, electrical consumption, post office receipts, newspaper advertising, building permits and factory payrolls. In the matter of factory payrolls, Chamber of Commerce reports show an 8% gain over last year at this time, in and around Rochester. As for building permits, local figures show a continual gain, particularly in residence property. Over a hundred new homes are said to have been started in Rochester and vicinity since the first of the year.

To students now entering business schools the foregoing information should be cheering news. It indicates that there will be few agonizing waits, helmsman-preparator and the opportunity to show one's worth. So say that it indicates that employment requirements will be less rigid, on the other hand, a mistake. Employment opportunities within the next two years will probably increase greatly in number, but only trained operators need apply. This is due partly to competitive standards resulting from the depression, partly from the nature of recent investments in office appliances and production machinery.

At Rochester Business Institute there will be, within three weeks, (September 2nd) a large number of young men and women busily engaged in training for the future. They will be studying to become accountants, bookkeepers, advertising copy-writers, marketing managers, secretaries, etc. For those contemplating registration at this school it is suggested that you do so at once.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Bake a pastry shell on the back of the pan; to prevent shrinking, prick it all over with a fork before putting it in the oven; when baked it will slide off easily.

In making fruit pies, sprinkle a little flour and sugar, mixed together, on the lower crust to prevent the juice from soaking into the crust.

To prevent white silk garments from turning yellow in washing, add one tablespoonful of wood alcohol to each part of rinsing water. White vinegar is also good to put in the rinsing water.

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
