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Along the Sports Horizon

Within the next three weeks, the Niagara football season will swing into town and the 1935 gridiron season will be officially on.

The Purple Haze took this year's edition of the Aquinas Institute eleven, and unless something drastic happens, Aquinas is in for another uncomfortable afternoon while the boys from Niagara pick off their annual victory.

It is not a question of the winner of the game but a question of the size of the score that will give the fans an insight into the potential strength of Coach Johnny Sullivan's charges.

For several years the Purple Haze proved the only stumbling block to an otherwise successful Aquinas record. This year probably will be no exception.

In some quarters a serious question is raised as to the feasibility of a high school team meeting a year's distance between a high school senior and a college freshman, nevertheless, that difference multiplied eleven times is certain to make it hell for the boys.

While it is being a bit too optimistic to expect victory for Aquinas in that opening game, nevertheless, the Purple Haze and college football are not stacked up against some hefty opposition.

The Aquinas squad at present has been picked from 175 to 200. Sullivan expects to start the season with an approximately equal number of odd players. Hence only about seven remain to be dropped before the opening game, giving every player a chance to show his worth.

When 175 candidates turn out in a school with an attendance of 1,000, it is no wonder that the school authorities should be a bit nervous. In other words, nearly one boy of every five registered at the school took a swing at the great game.

Although Aquinas authorities won't announce anything definite at this time, it is pretty certain that a basketball team will represent the school on the court this year.

Public support is essential to the success of a scholastic basketball team. When Aquinas decides to take on a full intramural schedule that support should come generously and steadily not only from the students and alumni but also from the community.

The Catholic Bowling League has been organized for 1935 and the old-time bowlers are expected to be replaced by a new group.

With the exception of O. L. P. H. replacing St. Andrew's, last year's team lineup is intact. St. Stanislaus, 1934-35 champs, will be back in the lineup.

Of course Gear's remarkable pitching stamped him not only as the greatest hurler in Rochester but one of the topnotchers of the nation. Pitching five straight shut-outs against the best team in the country simply isn't being done every day.

The bright light on the Kodak scene was "Shifty" Gear who received his MVP honors in his second year. Gear, who pitched eleven at second base for the Catholic League champs from Holy Rosary, met and conquered every pitcher in the country.

His four home runs, including a grand slam, were the only ones in the fourth round victory. The champion team, the St. Joseph's team, also turned in a great performance, connecting for a
