On Tuesday, Sept. 24, the meeting of the University and College Men and Women will be held. On the same day, the nurses, journalists and public service men will hold meetings. Under the chairmanship of the Most Rev. Hugh C. Boyle, Bishop of Pittsburgh who is Episcopal Chairman of the Press Department, the journalists will meet and will hear addresses by the Rev. James M. Gillis, C.S.P., editor of The Catholic World on "The Press as a Powerful Instrument of Catholic Action." The Rev. Edward Lodge Curran, editor of Light, on "The Influence on Catholic Action of the Journalist's Attitude Towards the Holy Eucharist" and the Rev. "Frank" J. Mullaly, S. J., editor of the Messenger of the Sacred Heart on "The Holy Eucharist and the Journalist."

Other meetings are scheduled for the Young Men's Parent Education Group, the Social Service Group, the Professional Men, and the Young Women. A dinner in honor of the Papal Legate will be given on Tuesday evening September 24. The Most Rev. William J. O'Brien, Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago will preside at the dinner. The Rev. Edward A. Reilly, chairman of the Congress Reception Committee, will be the toastmaster. Among the spiritual exercises of the Congress will be three "Holy Hours." The first will be held Tuesday September 24. The Most Rev. Urban J. Vehr, Bishop of Denver, will officiate. The Meditation will be given by the Most Rev. James J. Kearney, Bishop of Salt Lake. The "Holy Hour for Priests" will take place on Wednesday evening September 25. Cardinal Hayes will officiate while Bishop O'Brien will give the meditation. The "Holy Hour for Men" will take place from 11 to 12 p. m. on Wednesday. The Most Rev. Joseph E. Ritter, Bishop of Indianapolis will preside and the Most Rev. Robert F. Lacey, Bishop of Erie, will give the meditation. At midnight, the Apostolic Delegate will celebrate Mass in the course of which the Rev. Thomas F. Conlon, C.P., National Treasurer of the Holy Name Society will give the Holy Name Pledge.

On Thursday afternoon the solemn Eucharist procession will be held. The Episcopal Legate will bear the Blessed Sacrament in procession and the acclamations will be given by the Most Rev. Michael J. able to make practical their desire for serving the Church. So the school gives practical methods of organization in the past as well as organization based on sound psychological principles recognized by all."

Under Bishop Throughout the sessions of the Evening School, Miss Williams defined the fact that Catholic Action must in all instances be under the direction of the Bishop of the diocese and interpreted as each individual Bishop sees the need of interpreting it to meet special exigencies. Each day of school a one-sheet "newspaper" was prepared by the sponsors of the school and distributed to those attending. The purpose of the paper was described by its editors as being to concentrate chiefly on the "human interest" side of Evening School life.

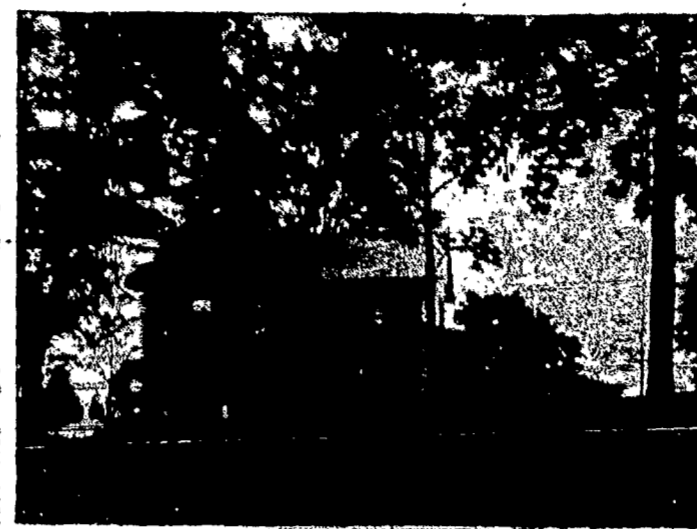
On the opening night of the school Monday the felicitations of the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester were extended to Miss Williams and to those attending. The Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, vicar general of the diocese, Miss Helen Quinlan, president of Rochester Parish Sodality, presided. One hour on Tuesday Wednesday and Thursday was devoted to a discussion of personality and leadership. Personality Miss Williams defined as "the sum total of those things the qualities character, motives and deeds which constitute a person and impress others."

Talks on Leaders It is necessary to have personality to the utmost in good leadership, the speaker stressed, but one must guard against the danger of over-personality.

The leader who does all the work himself is poor," said Miss Williams, "but the leader who attracts but does not work is worse than poor. Both are stupid." How Christ Himself sanctified and gave direction to His disciples was discussed by Miss Williams in one noteworthy lecture, while in a later one she developed a study of Mary as the first Catholic leader.

EXTRA PRIVILEGES IN CELEBRATION OF MASSES FOR SCOUT CHAPLAINS

Quebec (N.C.) His Eminence Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve, in a letter of instruction to the Sacred Congregation of the Sacraments, dated July 15, 1935, has accorded certain special privileges to duly appointed chaplains of Boy Scouts and Girl Guides in the Archdiocese. The chaplain will have the privilege of celebrating Mass on a portable altar anywhere, except on water, and under a tent or in the open air, provided the altar is properly protected from the wind. The privilege of distributing Holy Communion at the Masses in tents or in the open air is also conceded.
