Famed Jesuit Missioner, Native Of Waverly, Dies At Seneca Lake

Hector - The Rev. John D. McCarthy, S. J., native of Waverly, N. Y., died last Saturday, September 14, in the Cooper cottage on the east shore of Seneca Lake, at the age of 63.

Father McCarthy, for 28 years a missionary, died as a result of a seizure which had occurred about three weeks previously. His sister, Mrs. Theresa Murphy of Montclair, N. J., and a cousin, Dr. C. McCarthy, of Auburn were with him when he died.

He was born on October 25, 1872, and attended Fordham University after graduation from Waverly High School. Upon entering the Jesuit Order he studied at Woodstock, Maryland, and was ordained to the Holy Priesthood in July, 1899.

A Jesuit missionary, Father McCarthy travelled to the most distant corners of the world. He made an extraordinary trip through the fastness of Labrador, and was the first white man to visit the Great Falls of Canada, which has since been explored and surveyed by the Canadian government.

At one time Father McCarthy was professor of physics at Georgetown University and at St. Francis Xavier College in New York City. At the latter institution he also served as prefect of discipline.

Considered one of the most brilliant orators in the Jesuit Order, Father McCarthy was an outstanding Shakespearean actor, and took part in dramatic productions while at Georgetown. He wrote several plays, noteworthy among them being the production "Telemachus."

Father McCarthy is survived by a sister, Mrs. Theresa Murphy of Montclair, N. J.; stepmother, Mrs. Daniel McCarthy, 155 Boardman Street, Elmira; a half brother, Edwin McCarthy; and a half sister, Mrs. Anna Hourigan, Elmira.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday morning in St. Joseph's Church, Williams Alley, Philadelphia, Pa. It was in this church, the second oldest Catholic Church in America, that Father McCarthy gave the tercentenary sermon two years ago. Burial was at Waverly, Pa.
