His Eminence George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, told why each Cardinal has a titular church in Rome. The ceremonies marked the Cardinal's twenty-sixth anniversary as a Bishop. "When an ecclesiastical is created a Cardinal," His Eminence said, "the Pope makes him the pastor of one of Rome's oldest churches. Indeed it is as pastor of such church that he sits in the consistory and elects the Bishop of Rome, who at each is head of the universal Church. In the past the Church assigned to a new Cardinal from America was one usually very much in need of repair, the cost of which he would help to meet to some extent. But to me the Holy Father gave one of the really beautiful churches of Rome, of great historical value, replete with artistic treasures, paintings, and statues of the greatest of artists.
