Message from President At this outpouring of the city's residents, Catholics and non-Catholics, James A. Farley, Postmaster General of the United States as official representative of President Roosevelt, brought the Chief Executive's best wishes for the success of the Congress in a letter which incorporated also a striking assertion of a nation's need for religion and himself paid a homage to the Eucharist as King.

More than 40,000 persons attended the General Assembly in Cleveland at the Municipal Stadium Tuesday. The assembly followed and preceded the sermon by means of loud speakers in the street.

OHIO AND CLEVELAND HONOR CARD HAYES AS PAPA LEGATE

Ohio and Cleveland, in the persons of their Chief Executives, stood side by side with the Most Rev. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland, and the Most Rev. James A. McFadden, his Auxiliary, to greet His Eminence, Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York, Papal Legate to the Eucharistic Congress, as the Holy Father's envoy and his aide arrived at Union Terminal Monday morning.

Assembling at the platform, the group including the two Bishops and Governor Martin L. Davey, of Ohio and Mayor Harry L. Davis, of Cleveland, escorted the Papal Legate and his aide to the Public Square in front of the terminal where a huge and enthusiastic throng of the city's residents acclaimed the beloved representative of the Holy Father.

While the Legate and his attendants were proceeding through the city, prelates and clergy stood waiting at the entrance of the Cathedral and upon his arrival formed a guard of red and black soutanes and white surplices. When the Legate arrived he was greeted by Bishop Schrembs and then entered the Cathedral for the Liturgical Reception.

Tells Why Cardinal Has Titular Church

Chicago (NC) In the ceremonies Sunday dedicating Santa Maria del Popolo Church in Mundelein, Ill. His Eminence George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, told why each Cardinal has a titular church in Rome. The ceremonies marked the Cardinal's twenty-sixth anniversary as a Bishop. "When an ecclesiastic is created a Cardinal," His Eminence said, "the Pope makes him the pastor of one of Rome's oldest churches. Indeed it is as pastor of such church that he sits in the conclave and elects the Bishop of Rome, who at each is head of the universal Church. In the past the Church assigned to a new Cardinal from America was one usually very much in need of repair, the cost of which he would help to meet to some extent. But to me the Holy Father gave one of the really beautiful churches of Rome, of great historical value, replete with artistic treasures, paintings, and statues of the greatest of artists. There was nothing for me to replace or repair. I was under no expense on this score. It was then the idea was born in my mind that with God's help I would attempt even in my small way to place another Santa Maria del Popolo in my own Diocese, transplanting to some extent a shoot or a branch from this sturdy old tree, a daughter of this ancient and Christian Church from the Eternal City into the new world."

How solemn, how impressive is the Church's constant appeal for prayers for departed souls! Monsignor Cameron declared, "Flowers wither and die, tombstones are destroyed, but the constant appeal of the faithful goes on to the throne of God. In the Catholic Church, every day, prayers are not offered for the dead. Every time the priest offers the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, the dead are not forgotten."

When temptation leads to things that are wrong, when modern philosophy assaults, each should be thoughtful that all is pleasure and there is no responsibility, Monsignor Cameron urged that a visit be made to the cemetery to learn the true value of life and its significance. "Then," he said, "are we reminded of the frailty of mortal life and realize that after all nothing matters but the soul."
