Two New Music Works by Kreckel Are Announced

A new mass, "Missa Brevis et Melodica," and volume III of "Musica Divina" original organ music compositions of Philip G. Kreckel, organist at St. Boniface Church, will be published this month by J. Fischer and Brothers, New York City. The third volume of the "Musica Divina" series is due from the press on October 15. In the current number of "Fischer Edition News," the publishing company praises the work of Mr. Kreckel highly. Church organists all over the world, according to the "News," are by this time familiar with Philip G. Kreckel's two volumes of original organ music, "Musica Divina." All the compositions in these two books are based on themes taken from Gregorian melodies and Catholic hymns, and because of the outstanding trend which the composer has given them, they have come to be known as the most valuable contribution to Catholic organ music ever made in this country. The best loved and most popular work organized the first having already gone into several editions, and there has been a constant demand that the series be extended.

Arnold Lunn, English Author, Noted Convert to Lecture Here

One of the most noted converts to Catholicism in recent years, Arnold Lunn, famous English author and a leader of contemporary thought in the British Empire, is coming to Rochester Tuesday evening, Oct. 8, for a lecture under the auspices of Nazareth College. Mr. Lunn will speak on "Some Leaders of Modern Thought," according to an announcement received from his publisher, Sister Teresa Marie, dean of Nazareth College. One strongly anti-Catholic in his writings, the English author gained world-wide attention with the publication of his latest work, "Now I See," a saga of his conversion to the Catholic Church and the reasons which impelled him to make the change. In reviewing "Now I See," the Rev. Francis X. Downey, S. J., says: "This is a book that would come as a light star through the darkness to those who are groping, as so many are groping today, for truth and happiness. It is the odyssey of the soul of a man who knew the heart of his own mind well enough to write: There is I think a moment in the lives of those who deny Christ when they catch a glimpse, however fleeting, of the face that Peter saw when the Lord turned and looked upon Peter." Those who have sensed the unspoken question on those lips will have no peace until they have found the answer. Try as they may to turn their minds to other problems, they will find themselves returning again and again to this most perplexing, the most maddening and the most tremendous of all conundrums that have plagued the mind of man.

Sociality Is Formed In Waverly Parish

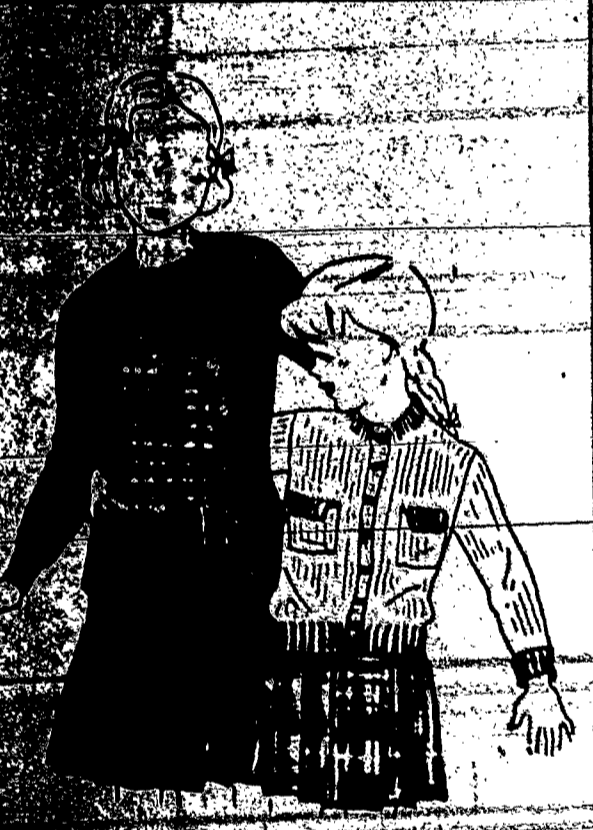
