The School and Leisure

In the light of these statements
there is ample justification for the
development of recreational and
physical educational activities in
the Catholic Schools, moreover it
is only common sense to say that a
balanced program of physical edu-
cation is an effective means of
training students for worthwhile
use of leisure.
Another evidence of the school's
interest in leisure may be seen in
the wider use of the school plant.
Our schools no longer close their
doors at the end of the formal in-
struction. Provision is made for
the use of the school as a social
and community center. Social,
educational and recreational activ-
ities with the school as the focal
point are being provided for
people of all ages for children
outside of school hours, for young
people out of work, for adults with
much leisure at their disposal.

Young people are leaving school
today to face a muddled economic
situation and in many instances
their educational equipment seems
rightly inadequate. With unlim-
ited leisure at their disposal, these
young people do not know which
way to go. Commercialized amuse-
ments beckon to them at every
turn. Vice and crime constitute a
powerful force in the life of youth
and these scordid things catch up
with him in his leisure moments.
Violent literature, cheap movies,
jazz music, immoral shows, these
are the attractions held out to
youth today and these are the
things that make it almost impos-
sible for modern youth to lift his
head above the level of mediocrity.
I do not mean to say that youth
wants these things, but we can-
not easily understand that youth has
little or no choice in the matter.
The school can do much for
youth in preparing him for wise
and worthy use of leisure without
regimentation of his free time. It
can, for example, hold up before
him the principle of morality by
which he can regulate his conduct
during leisure as well as during
working hours. It can lead into
the student's mind and heart a yearn-
ing for the best in literature, in
music, in art, yes, and for religion,
also. This religious aspect of the
leisure time program is beautifully
expressed by the Rev. Daniel
Lord, S. J. in his pamphlet, "Hours
Off." Speaking of leisure for God,
Father Lord says, "The life of a
just man and woman is a long-
continued service to God. But the
moments of intensest devotion and
service are all moments when he or
she is at leisure. God expects part
of that leisure time to Himself. It
is not a time when he is some-
where else, but a time when he is
not laughing before the great Judge
pleads as his silly excuse that he had
no leisure to serve God."
