follow where she led, were it even to death. And not a detail of daily life escaped her care and foresight. She might at this hour have a vision or an ecstasy in which she seems to have, like St. Paul, entered the Third Heaven, and the next hour she would invite half a dozen letters to people of most different grades. Society, in speaking to each on his own plane of intelligence. And, as Mrs. Graham remarks, she describes a vision or ecstasy with the same calmness and objective detachment as she does the foundation of a convent.

Mother Mary of St. Joseph, her chief lieutenant among the nuns who gathered around her in the Reform, has left a portrait of her called a post-portrait of her "Holy Mother," in which she gives a personal description of her personality. We are told in this appearance that "in her youth she had the reputation of being a beautiful and showed evidence of this even in her old age." At the time the portrait was painted she was in her 62nd year. She died six years later, in 1682.

In her youth she was not conscious of her beauty nor, especially, of her charms. In referring to the life to her time as a boarder in a convent of the Augustinian nuns, she says she was not long there until everybody was her friend and adds: "God has always given me that grace to attract the esteem and friendship of others."

Of the sculptured representations of Saint Teresa, two are famous. One is a statue in marble in Saint Peter's in Rome, and in the pedestal is read the inscription, "In Spiritu." The other is a statue in wood which is preserved in the Cathedral at Cordoba, Spain. It is the work of the great artist, Alonso Cano.

But the sanctity of Teresa did not depend on good looks, nor does her fame depend on the portrayals of her whether realistic or idealistic. She descended to the world, and especially just now, as the Reform. It is hardly to our credit that she has received more attention in these respects from Protestants and Catholics in England, Germany and France than she has from Catholic writers in the world of English speech. In English we have very little on her that is not vulgarly or superficially in person. If these lines increase ever so little in person, the writer will consider himself well repaid.

RURAL RELIGIOUS TRAINING LACK CAUSE OF CRIME, SAYS FR. BALL

Speaking over the Rochester Catholic Hour last Sunday, the Rev. John M. Ball, of Lima, local chairman of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference which holds its thirteenth annual convention here, October 27 to 31, emphasized the insufficiency of religious training in rural home and school, and placed this as an indirect cause for our Public Enemies, No. 1.

"The country always has been and always will be the feeder for the city," Father Ball declared. "The people who leave the country are the people who live in the city. Unless the source is pure, the stream cannot be wholesome."

Father Ball pointed out that the responsibility for these crimes and misdemeanors does not lie upon the shoulders of the children, nor entirely upon their parents. The remedy is a guiding force strong enough to combat this pronounced laxity and looseness in ideals of living. By applying the teachings of the Church, the National Catholic Rural Life Conference is offering a guiding force capable of coping with these rural difficulties.

"One of the chief projects with which the Conference has concerned itself to date," Father Ball said, "is the popularizing and spreading of the religious vacation schools," the means through which this necessary religious training is given.
