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Central Verein Hears Purposes Of 2 Conventions

Explanation of the purposes of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference and the National Catholic Conference on the next week was made by various speakers at the regular meeting of the Central Verein, Catholic Central Verein of America, Sunday afternoon in St. Joseph's Hall.

The Rev. James A. Byrne of St. Paul, Minn., executive secretary of the Rural Life Conference in an informative address reviewed the rise of industrialism, the effect on the rural population of the trek to the city. This has resulted, he said, in what was formerly one-quarter urban population becoming three-quarters and vice versa in the rural communities.

Overcrowding of cities with unnatural living conditions in the city has resulted with harmful effects on the rural population.

Decreasing number of births in the United States was cited as extremely harmful to the nation. Father Byrne spoke of the work being done by Dr. O. E. Baker, secretary of the National Council of Agriculture, Washington, who from a scientific viewpoint is opposing birth control because of resultant lack of consumption in the nation.

The Rev. Joseph H. Goffel described the Eucharistic Congress in Cleveland.

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GROUP OF YOUTHS HERE DONATE SERVICES TO TRAIN BOY LEADERS

By FRANCIS W. Mc DONALD "It is more blessed to give than to receive!" How many of us follow this age-old proverb as we wind our way through life? To the best of our knowledge, not many of us can truthfully say, "Why, yes, I have always followed that rule." For one to make an approximate guess as to what percentage of the people could answer to the above in the right manner would be out of the question. But right here in our own circle, there is a little society, boasting of some thirty eight members, who have been following this old proverb for the past three years, and hope that they may be able to continue doing so for the years to come. The name of this society is known as the Don Bosco Society. There are no doubt many readers of the CATHOLIC COURIER who have never heard of this little group of workers, and so at this time we shall endeavor to explain the origin of this society. Some time ago, the physical director of the Columbus Youth's Association, was contacted with a young fellow, by the name of Don Bosco, from San Francisco, who was interested in the time work of the "CXA" called a meeting of some of his friends to see what could be done in the way of training the physical director of some of the youth centers, very short session the young men agreed to become leaders in the instruction of the boys who were members of the "CXA". The next thing that was necessary, was to choose a name that would be appropriate. After careful deliberation the name of, "The Don Bosco Society" was chosen. This name above all names under consideration proved to be the most appropriate, because the work that made Don Bosco the idol of young children, was to be undertaken by this group. Don Bosco was a priest who lived in the Nineteenth Century. Upon seeing ragged urchins roaming the streets, his heart was filled with pity. He interested wealthy noblemen who would contribute clothes and food, then he would take them to his shop and instruct them in religion, thus making these youngsters think that life was worth living. The work of this lovable saint still continues in no small manner through the untiring efforts of the members of this club. The membership at the start of the club was eight. Gradually more were added until now the membership numbers thirty eight, with more wishing to give of their services. At the present time, these thirty eight leaders are instructing boys of the Columbus Youth Association in twenty two different subjects, baseball, basketball, study of nature and religion are a few of the things that these leaders are imparting to the boys under their direction.
