Only 17 years after the close of a world war another war is well under way. The declared purpose of that great war was "to end war," to make the world safe for democracy, or as a British statesman put it, "to make a world fit for heroes to live in." What would be his definition of a hero was not very clear for it was the same statesman who sent the heroic "Black and Tan" into Ireland to make a paradise in that country. In any case, we have another war, and the menace of another conflagration in Europe. The "special correspondents," news agencies and daily press have begun to do their part vigorously. The war news has already displaced our own minor battles on the front page. Every body is, accordingly, talking about it. So I don't see any adequate reason why we should not talk about it too. I don't expect every reader of the CATHOLIC COURIER to accept my views on the subject, but neither do I consider that an adequate reason for not mentioning it to you.

I believe our first duty in this affair is to keep our heads and to use them in all ways there is danger of losing them. I don't mean merely on the battlefield, but at home in your easy chair as you read your daily paper. Those of us who have lived through two wars into which this country of ours was drawn can remember how it was done. And we must have a dull mind, or at least a poor memory, who can read the daily papers today without recalling the propaganda of twenty years ago. The "atrocities," how German soldiers cut off the hands of little Belgian babies or carried them in triumph on the tips of their bayonets, and how the German government had set up factories to bolt down the corpses of the slain and possibly wounded to get out of them the fats and oils which they could not procure from abroad. And as a minor detail I might mention, that when the war was over, officials of the English War Office declared that all these were lies, fabricated, however, in a good cause and justified as legitimate war propaganda.

Propaganda Flowy

The propaganda of the war in Africa had not run twenty-four hours until we had the blood-curdling "atrocities." The Italian army had bombed Red Cross hospitals, and American nurses bound on a munition of charity had been killed, whole villages of helpless women and little Ethiopian children had been wiped out by showers of poison gas. The "atrocities" of the Italian forces so ran the front page headlines and big print. When you had read these and most of the dispatch, you were informed in small print, that "it was rumored," and further on you were informed that "it was rumored" in Addis Ababa the Ethiopian capital 600 miles from the nearest Italian outpost and in another instance you were informed that the only means of communication between the war front and Addis Ababa were runners and drum beating. So you see it is well to keep our heads and to use them and what is the source of all this information.

But some one will perhaps say: I am not against Italy, but against that tyrant Mussolini and his fascist hordes. My dear friend, that is all nonsense. It is part of the propaganda. Give a dog a bad name you remember the old proverb "To a tin can will find every corner-boy will find a rock at him." Mussolini has decried democracy. He has called it a "crime" and that the treatment of any subject should begin with the denunciation, and I would like to know just what it is meant by Democracy when it is printed with a capital "D." I would like also to know what Democracy meant in Italy before the World War when the country was ruled by a group of Fascists of the Franco-Corinthian type and Athens. That one man, even if he were a super-man could for the past fifteen years regiment forty-four millions of the most democratic people in Europe and hold them together in a species of slavery is utterly preposterous. Whatever we may think of Fascism as a system of government it is precisely clear that it is for the present the most efficient of the Italian people. It is also certain that under this regime Italy has made more progress in every field of endeavor than she has made in the last century.

A standing proof of the kind, humane and democratic character of the Italian people is seen in the fact that everybody who has lived in Italy and become acquainted with the real Italian people bears emphatic testimony to it. Englishmen, for instance, are proverbially inquisitive and well-opinioned. Yet the Englishmen and Englishwomen who have lived in Italy are among the most enthusiastic eulogists of her people. The books that have been written by such people in praise of Italy and its people would stock a small library the Lyons, the Brownings, the Ruskins, the Howells, the St. John's. A book on Italy has been reviewed some time ago in the London Tablet, and in that book the non-Catholic author asks how it is that the peasantry in Catholic countries are so much more kind, courteous, polite than they write in other countries? And (I quote)

I hope Mussolini will succeed; he will be bitter for Ethiopia if he does succeed. If you don't believe these things, ask me and I will try to explain them.
