October, 1934—Archbishop Mooney's letter urging support of Aquinas Institute was read in all churches of the city.

October, 1934—Sodality of Holy Family Church, Auburn, marked hundredth anniversary of the founding of the church with a banquet.

October, 1934—Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., titular Archbishop of Viminacium, delivered sermon at the Pontifical High Mass celebrated October 14 at St. Mary's Church in observance of the founding of the church.

October, 1934—The Mercy Hospital Aid Association of Auburn was formed to assist Mercy Hospital financially, with Thomas J. Hennessy as chairman.

October, 1934—Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney celebrated solemn Pontifical Mass Sunday, October 28, on the occasion of the formal reopening of St. Ann's Church, Hornell.

October, 1934—Establishment of Junior Holy Name societies in parishes where they do not exist was discussed at the regular quarterly meeting of the Rochester Section of the Diocesan Holy Name Union.

October, 1934—Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney gave the opening address at the fourth annual convention of the Rochester Diocesan Council, N.C.C.W., held October 29-30.

November, 1934—Annual School Report was issued by the Rev. John M. Duffy, Diocesan Superintendent of Catholic Education, and showed that approximately 28,276 were attending Catholic schools in the diocese.

November, 1934—Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus, of the diocese gave a dinner in honor of the new Master of the Fifth District, City Court Judge Frederick J. Mix, November 10.

November, 1934—The Rev. Daniel A. Lord, S.J., addressed approximately 200 students at Nazareth College, November 2.

November, 1934—Thirtieth annual Conference of the Rochester Diocesan School Association was held at Aquinas Institute, November 2.

November, 1934—The Rev. Daniel A. Lord, S.J., principal speaker at a public rally under the auspices of the Rochester Parish Sodality Union, was interviewed by a representative of the CATHOLIC COURIER on the subject of the Legion of Decency film drive.

November, 1934—Construction was started on an addition to St. Anthony's Convent, Elmira, following a successful campaign to raise a fund of \$2,000.

November, 1934—Maurice F. Sammons, former editor and owner of the CATHOLIC COURIER, died Thursday, November 8, at the age of 59.

November, 1934—Sunday, November 11, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. William M. Hart, V.G., laid the cornerstone for the new St. George's Lithuanian Church, in Hudson Avenue.

November, 1934—Golden Jubilee of Nazareth Hall was observed Sunday,

November 18, when the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney celebrated Mass in the gymnasium of the school.

November, 1934—Lt. Harold H. Porter, 301st U. S. Cavalry Reserve, gave an address to K. of C. Boy Scout Troop No. 141, the Mothers' Auxiliary and the committeemen.

November, 1934—The Most Rev. Bernard J. Sullivan, S.J., Bishop of Patna, India, preached at the Annual Mission Sunday Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral.

November, 1934—A tea was given at the Catholic Women's Club in honor of Miss Eileen Hayes, a freshman at Nazareth College, who recently received the highest award in Girl Scouting, the Golden Eaglet pin.

November, 1934—Convention of the Catholic Rural Life Conference held in St. Paul, Minn., voted to hold its next annual convention in Rochester.

November, 1934—Ground was broken for the building of a new church for St. Ignatius Loyola parish, Hornell.

November, 1934—"Theory of Revelation" by Rev. Joseph J. Baierl, S. T. D.; "St. Bernard's Seminary;" and "Twelve Years in a Reformatory," by the Rev. Francis J. Lane of Elmira, were among the new books recommended by the Cardinal Hayes Literature Committee.

November, 1934—The Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney was elected Episcopal Chairman of the Department of Social Action, National Catholic Welfare Conference.
