January, 1935—It was announced that Catholic juvenile books, the "Rainbow Series of Medal Stories," edited by the Daughters of Charity at Emmitsburg, Maryland, were on sale at ten-cent stores throughout the country.

January, 1935—MERCEDES, semi-annual publication of Mercy High School, appeared, carrying a series of interviews with notable persons.

January, 1935—The Rev. Frederick Necker, C. S. R., of St. Joseph's Church, gave a lecture on the Brazil Missions to a joint meeting of The Catholic Central Verein of America, Rochester Branch, and the National Catholic Women's Union, Rochester Branch.

January, 1935—The Rev. Dr. Walter A. Foery, director of Catholic Charities and Rochester diocesan representative of the Catholic Welfare Council of the State of New York, issued a statement opposing the proposed child labor amendment to the Federal Constitution.

February, 1935—Sister Mary Magdalena of the Foreign Mission Sisters of St. Dominic, visited her mother, Mrs. Michael Urlacher, 53 Rialto Street, before leaving for hospital work in Shanghai, China.

February, 1935—The Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, V.G., delivered a lecture at the Junior Safety Patrol Rally at the Eastman Theatre, February 9.

February, 1935—Catholic Boy Scouts of Rochester heard Mass in a body at St. Boniface Church on Sunday morning, February 10. Father Gerald Lambert, the Scout Chaplain, said Mass, and Father Joseph Vogt of St. Boniface Church delivered the sermon.

February, 1935—Holy Name Society of Holy Rosary Church adopted a resolution condemning treatment of Catholics in Mexico, and urging the President of the United States to take action.

February, 1935—Subscription Campaign of the Rochester Diocesan Holy Name Union for the CATHOLIC COURIER started with the reading of the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney's message for Catholic Press Month in the churches of the diocese.

February, 1935—"For the Catholics of the Diocese of Rochester, the Catholic Press should mean first of all the Catholic Courier," declared Archbishop Edward Mooney in his message for Catholic Press Month.

February, 1935—The Rev. John M. Ball, pastor of St. Rose's Church, Lima, N. Y., was appointed Director of the Diocesan Rural Life Bureau.

February, 1935—Miss Isabel T. Goss was elected president of the Board of Directors of Mercy Hospital, Auburn, at the annual election of officers.

February, 1935—Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society held its annual meeting. Election of officers took place, and a resolution passed calling upon the United States government to cease intervening in Mexican affairs.

February, 1935—Geneva Nocturnal Adoration Society held its first annual banquet.

February, 1935—Dorothy Day, Editor of the Catholic Worker, lectured before the Catholic Women's Club in the Columbus Civic Centre Building. She declared: "If we as Catholics had the same zeal as the Communists for social justice, the world would soon be changed."

February, 1935—Joseph LaLumia, student at St. Andrew's Seminary, was awarded second prize in the college classification of the Mt. Rushmore National Memorial inscription, essay contest, conducted by the Hearst newspapers.

February, 1935—Annual election of officers of the Holy Name Society of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira, resulted in the election of John Lordens as president. A resolution against the deplorable persecution of Catholics in Mexico was read. All Holy Name members were urged to take an active part in the current CATHOLIC COURIER drive.

February, 1935—More than 2,200 persons as members of the Columbus Club received a total of 164,142 services during 1934, according to figures compiled by the Health Education Department of the club.
