May, 1935—Diocesan Library Institute and Book Exhibit were held May 3 and 4 under the direction of the Rev. John M. Duffy, Superintendent, Catholic Schools, Diocese of Rochester.

May, 1935—Dr. Joseph J. Reilly, Ph.D., acting head of the English department of Hunter College, lectured on Charles Lamb in Nazareth Academy Auditorium, May 3.

May, 1935—The Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester, addressed the opening session of the Library Institute and Book Exhibit, May 3, in the ballroom of Columbus Civic Center Building.

May, 1935—Observance of the 100th anniversary of the incorporation of the city of Clyde was signalled by the ringing of the angelus at St. John's Catholic Church, Thursday noon, May 2.

May, 1935—Over 325 delegates from various parts of the Rochester diocese attended the Library Institute and Book Exhibit, May 3 and 4, sponsored by the Diocesan Office of Education.

May, 1935—Funeral services were held for the Rev. Pietro G. Moia, pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Church for nearly a quarter of a century.

May, 1935—Little Theatre players of Auburn won highest honors in the fourth annual Western New York Catholic Dramatic Contest, staged in Holy Family Auditorium, Auburn.

May, 1935—David Curtin, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Curtin, won the gold medal for oratory in Nazareth Hall's annual contest.

May, 1935—The Rev. Edward M. Weigel, C.S.S.R. of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, New York City, and a native of Rochester, celebrated the diamond jubilee of his priesthood on May 21 in New York.

May, 1935—Elmira Holy Name Society Softball League was organized with eight teams: St. Cecilia's, St. Patrick's, St. Anthony's, St. Peter and Paul's, St. Mary's, St. Casimir's, St. Charles and St. John's.

May, 1935—Winifred Murphy was chosen May Queen at the annual May Day festivities of Nazareth College.

May, 1935—CATHOLIC COURIER reader survey questionnaire returns indicated: intense reader-interest, a superior type of readers, and a high purchasing power that raises the CATHOLIC COURIER circulation considerably above the average of most daily newspapers.

May, 1935—Large numbers of interested men and women attended the first public meeting held in St. Joseph's Hall to mark the anniversaries of Pope Leo's encyclical "On the Condition of Labor" and Pope Pius' "Reconstruction of the Social Order," sponsored by the Rochester Branches, Catholic Central Verein of America and National Catholic Women's Union.

May, 1935—Pupils of Rochester parochial schools gave a demonstration of their training in liturgical music when they united to chant a Solemn High Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral on Saturday, May 25.

May, 1935—Perpetual novena to Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal was opened in St. Margaret Mary's Church, Irondequoit, by the Rev. Charles J. Bruton, pastor, on May 27.

May, 1935—Fourteenth annual mission sponsored at the Elmira-State Reformatory by the Rev. Francis J. Lane, Catholic chaplain, was directed by the Rev. Stephen Sweeney, C. P., of the Passionist monastery in Union City, N. J.

May, 1935—Students of St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary distributed copies of "The Catholic Worker" in downtown Rochester on May Day, as part of a program of militant Catholic Action.

May, 1935—The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, Rochester, delivered an address on "The Present Crisis" at the quarterly meeting of Board of Directors, Rochester Diocesan Council, National Council of Catholic Women held in Ithaca on May 4.

May, 1935—First "Catholic College Day" was observed in Columbus Civic Center Building on May 11 by Rochester Circle, International Federation of Catholic Alumni, co-operating with the New York Chapter.

May, 1935—Mrs. Cora McParlin, 76, of 25 Darwin Road, died. Mrs. McParlin, Supreme Trustee and president, Rochester Advisory Senate, had been a leading figure in the Ladies Catholic Benevolent Association for more than 40 years. She was awarded the cross "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" by the Holy Father in 1932.

May, 1935—The Very Rev. Msgr. Robert F. Keegan, Secretary for Charities to His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York, gave the opening address of the Rochester Community Chest campaign.
