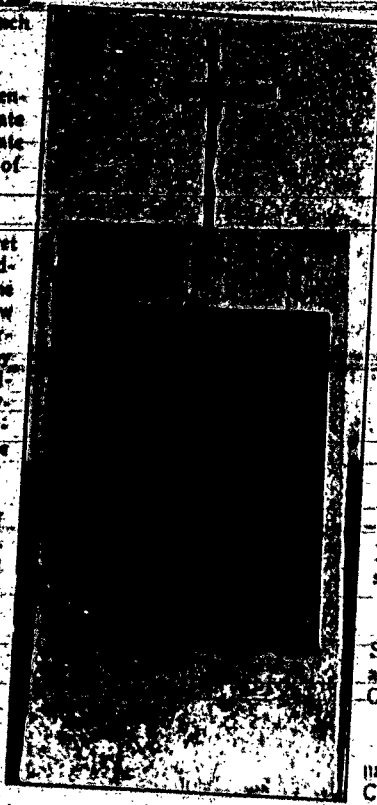

September, 1935—Charles T. Trust of Rochester elected State President of Catholic Central Union of America at New York State Branch convention held in Buffalo.

September, 1935—Martin K. Fenelon of Rochester was selected State Secretary at the 59th New York State convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians held in Buffalo.

September, 1935—Miss Margaret O'Connell, Nazareth Academy graduate, was second highest among the 730 high school graduates of New York State to win four-year scholarships, according to report issued by the Department of Education in Albany. Her four-year high school average was 99.142. Eleven scholarships in all were won by three of the Catholic high schools of Rochester.

September, 1935—Commendation of work done at Pius X School of Liturgical Music summer sessions held at Academy of the Sacred Heart and encouragement for future sessions were expressed by Archbishop Mooney at Solemn High Mass marking close of the sessions.

September, 1935—The Rev. John J. Sellinger, pastor of St. Anthony's Church, Gorton, was elected State Chaplain of the American Legion, Department of New York at session held in Rochester.

September, 1935—Archbishop Mooney officiated at the dedication of the new church edifice of St. Ignatius of Loyola Parish, Rev. Ignatius X. Cameron, pastor, in Hornell. The Rev. John B. Sullivan, pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, Rochester gave the dedicatory sermon.

September, 1935—First Evening School of Catholic Action in New York State was successfully conducted in Columbus Civic Center Building and sponsored by Rochester Parish Sodality Union. Miss Dorothy Willmann, associate editor of The Queen's Work, conducted the sessions.

September, 1935—One thousand Catholics of the Diocese of Rochester, headed by Archbishop Mooney and the Rev. Joseph H. Gefell, attended the great National Eucharistic Congress in Cleveland. Archbishop Mooney spoke at the Young Women's sectional meeting of the Congress.

September, 1935—Miss Dorothy M. Schiffert of 883 Harvard Street won a year's tuition scholarship to the Catholic University in Washington.

September, 1935—The Rev. Bernard J. Gefell, pastor of St. Jerome's Church, East Rochester, was honored at a celebration of the thirtieth anniversary of the church and of Father Gefell's pastorate.

The vista unchanged by the passing of 256 years, a stone memorial was mounted by a bronze cross today marks the location of the first church in the vicinity of Rochester. Dedicated Sunday, Oct. 13, on the grounds of Mercy High School, it recalls the little bark chapel where FATHERS LOUIS HENNEPIN, ZENON MUMBER and GABRIEL RINOUCK offered the Sacrifice of the Mass. To honor these Franciscan friars, HIRSHMAN HETZLER, DR. EDWARD J. BYRNE, ALEXANDER M. STEWART, planned the marker which was unveiled by Mr. Hetzler's nine-year old daughter. Credit for finding its location as well as for many other facts of its history, here belongs to Mr. STEWART, historian for the Catholic Council, who offers in this supplement an article on early missionary priests. September, 1935—The Rev. James C. McAniff, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard McAniff, Rochester, celebrated his first Solemn High Mass in his parish church at St. Augustine's after returning from Rome. Father McAniff was ordained Dec. 5, 1933 in Rome.

September, 1935—Twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of St. Joseph's Ukrainian Catholic Church, Rochester, was celebrated with High Mass and other appropriate ceremonies and exercises.

September, 1935—Leading members of the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish faiths in Rochester united in a successful campaign to raise funds to complete the new Jewish Young Men's and Women's Association building, corner Thruway Avenue and Anderson Street.

September, 1935—St. Bernard's Seminary received a bequest of \$5,000 in the will of Mrs. Angela F. Hoffherr.

September, 1935—Sudden death of the Rev. Lester M. Morgan, 38, newly appointed English instructor at St. Andrew's Seminary, who was stricken with a heart attack while at the wheel of his automobile Sept. 9, shocked his many friends among priests, lay people and especially students of Aquinas Institute to whom he had been teacher and friend.

September, 1935—Announcement made by principal of Our Lady of Mercy High School that Mercedes, in Buffalo.

September, 1935—A large throng of members of the Ladies Catholic Benevolent Association attended the funeral of Mrs. Cora McParlin, Supreme Trustee and leader of the Rochester area branch for many years.

September—The Rev. Hubert Bisky and the Rev. Benedict Ehmman were each granted a year of absence; the former to study at the Catholic University in Washington and the latter at Pope Pius X School of Liturgical Music in New York.
