Government Study Urge by Speaker At K. C. Dinner

The annual Christmas dinner of the Geneva Council of the Knights of Columbus was held Monday evening, Dec. 18, at the Kirkwood Hotel. The Rev. Bernard C. Hanna of St. Francis de Sales church was chairman and the principal speaker was the Rev. William L. Walsh of Syracuse. John Davis was toastmaster.
