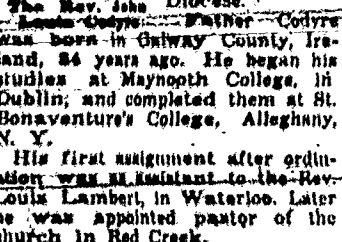

Final Tribute Paid Fr. William Brick, Oldest Priest

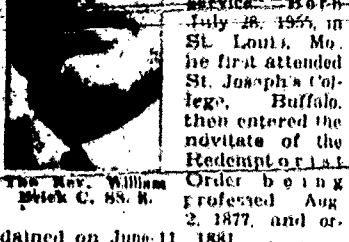

Touching Letter of Guidance Left His Children by Late John Klem

This touching letter from John Klem, 33, Civil War veteran, of 228 Lombard Street, who died Dec. 29, 1935, was read by his children after his death according to his wishes. The touching spirit of this father of a large family and his sincere concern for his spiritual welfare of his children is revealed in the following words: To All My Dear Children: You all know that I have worked and tried hard to be a good man for your benefit, but it seems that it was God's will that this inheritance should be small. Now, my dear children, be satisfied with what little there is, make good use of it, and may God bless you and give you the grace of the Holy Catholic Faith, and for his grace which I have to you all and which is more precious than any worldly wealth, namely, my Catholic Faith. I cannot thank God enough for this greatest of all gifts, that I was born and brought up in the Holy Roman Catholic Faith, and I hope through the grace of God to die in this holy Faith. In this same Holy Faith, my dear children, you have all been brought up. Persevere in this Faith, my dear children, I beg of you with all the love of a father's heart and with my eyes full of tears, persevere in this Holy Faith which you have inherited from your parents. Live according to the principles of the Holy Faith and God will reward you here and in the life to come. O my dear ones, if you only knew the anxiety of my heart as I pen these lines, fearing that perhaps one of you would get lost. But no, my dear children, I know that all of you will try hard with the grace of God to live and die in the Holy Catholic Faith, and for his grace you must daily pray to our Holy Mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and to Holy St. Joseph.
