All this has a bearing on one's fitness for jury duty.

At the time of the Hauptmann trial and conviction, we emphatically condemned both procedure and verdict.

Last Sunday in Chicago the president of the AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION, William T. Ransom, declared—

"The important question is whether a trial so conducted was in accord with a public sense of justice and propriety.

In his "Trial by Fury," appearing in the FORUM for January, Richard A. Knight, a lawyer, who has "no more admiration for Hauptmann than you have," sets forth as the purpose of his article the advancement of the proposition that "the decision presents, as did the conviction before it, a monstrous miscarriage of justice bearing social implications of the gravest and most alarming character."

"Last Spring," writes Mr. Knight, "in the midst of a mob of pennut enters in an atmosphere suggestive of a cockpit rather than a court, Hauptmann was tried and found guilty, allegedly on circumstantial evidence, not of kidnaping nor of extortion but of murder. Now kidnaping is one thing, and extortion is another, and murder, quite distinctly, is yet a third.

Who next will be caught in the clutch of such adverse circumstance? It could be you, or you, or you.

But from "trial by fury" may all good powers deliver us all.

Concerning "social implications of the gravest and most alarming character," Mr. Knight affirms that "in a society in which anybody is to be safe, criminal convictions may not be based upon hunches or personal opinions—not even on yours or mine. They must be based upon legal evidence and legal evidence alone. Otherwise, everybody becomes at once a potential victim of the miscalculable intuitions of the mob, and there is no law or safety anywhere."

It has not bit dizzy. Maybe you can figure it out. Without doubt, you have been reading and studying the majority and minority opinions of the Supreme Court on the AAA.

In his syndicated article of January 7, David Lawrence says that "The Supreme Court unanimously upheld the Alexander Hamilton conception of the use of the spending power of Congress for the 'general welfare'... Thus, for example, Congress can pay out a subsidy to shipping or the coal industry or to farmers any amount it wishes, so long as it doesn't condition the gift upon some action by the recipient or some compliance on his part with some action sought in return by Congress."

Does this mean to you that Congress can give the money, but therefore must forget about it? That Congress has no power to see to it that the purpose for which it was given is fulfilled?

In a signed statement appearing in THE NEW YORK TIMES of January 12, Raymond Moley, in opposition to the majority opinion of the Court on AAA, that "the omission of legal precedents is especially noteworthy... It (the opinion) is certainly not derived from the words of the Constitution. There is still a third point, the matter of States' rights. Mr. Moley goes into that, too.

"Surely, it could not have been derived from the doctrine of States' rights, for only two weeks ago, in Cuyler v. Harvey (the Vermont tax case) the identical majority of six, overturning a unanimous reversal of decisions of sixty years' standing, introduced a construction of the privileges and immunities clause pregnant with heretofore unimagined limitations upon State power.

"As citizens of the United States," said Mr. Justice Sutherland in that case, "we are part of a single great community consisting of all the States united and not of distinct communities consisting of the States severally."

Writes Roscoe Stetten of the Yale Law School in THE NEW YORK TIMES, January 12—

"Granting that Congress has power to tax, that it has power to spend in the national welfare, still if it sees fit to condition its spending, in order, as pointed out by the minority, to carry out effectually the purpose which justifies the spending in the first place, then the whole structure must fall. Why? Because, in the view of the majority, this would constitute an invasion of rights reserved to the States, although it could point to its provision in the Constitution requiring that the broad grant of power to Congress to spend in the general welfare must be so crippled... Surely a century of government intervention via the tariff to reduce the supply of industrial goods at the expense of agriculture should lend respectability to similar grants in aid of agriculture."

STRANGE BUT TRUE Catholic Facts But Little Known

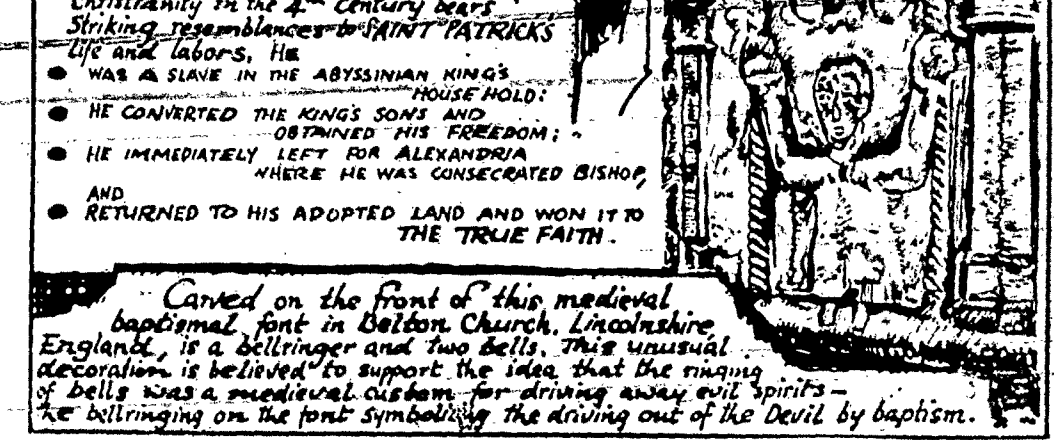

Although considerably mutilated this STATUE OF THE MADONNA is venerated in the English College, Valladolid, Spain. The statue was damaged by English troops when they sacked Cadix in 1596.

The KING OF THE BELGIANS IS NAMED IN THE CANON OF THE MASS after the Pope and Bishop of the Diocese in Belgium today in accordance with a medieval custom by which the Sovereign was thus included in the Church's solemn prayers.

The story of SAINT TRUMENTIUS who converted Abyssinia to Christianity in the 4th century bears striking resemblance to SAINT PATRICK'S life and labors. He WAS A SLAVE IN THE ABYSSINIAN KING'S HOUSEHOLD; HE CONVERTED THE KING'S SON TO CHRISTIANITY; HE IMMEDIATELY LEFT FOR ALEXANDRIA WHERE HE WAS CONSECRATED BISHOP; AND RETURNED TO HIS ADOPTED LAND AND WON IT TO THE TRUE FAITH.

Carved on the front of this medieval baptismal font in Bilton Church, Lincolnshire, England, is a bellringer and two bells. This unusual decoration is believed to support the idea that the ringing of bells was a medieval custom for driving away evil spirits—the bellringing on the font symbolizing the driving away of the Devil by baptism.
