CHURCH STRENGTH LIES IN RURAL AREAS, DECLARES FATHER LIGUTTI

Orchard Lake, Mich. (N.Y.) The strength of the Catholic Church lies in the rural and not the urban areas, declared the Rev. Luigi Ligutti, pastor of the Church of the Assumption, Granger, Ia., and a leader in the Granger Suburbans Homesteads project, in a lecture given before students of St. Mary's College and the SS Cyril and Methodius Seminary, here. Speaking on the "Objective of the Catholic Rural Life Movement," Father Ligutti declared that city life tends to "curtail the religious life of the city people." "The faith and morals become lax," he added, "and spiritual needs are disregarded while material wants are elevated to prime importance. Large families are becoming extinct and this is a serious threat to the stability of the Catholic population in the United States."
