Orchard Lake, Mich. (N.Y.) The strength of the Catholic Church lies in the rural and not the urban areas, declared the Rev. Luigi Ligutti, pastor of the Church of the Assumption, Granger, Ia., and a leader in the Granger Suburbans Homesteads project, in a lecture given before students of St. Mary's College and the SS Cyril and Methodius Seminary here.

Speaking on the "Objective of the Catholic Rural Life Movement," Father Ligutti declared that city life tends to "curtail the religious life of the city people."
