Noted Jesuit Writer Talks to Rochester Holy Cross Alumni

Father Ertl, outlined the traditions of Holy Cross College, Worcester, Mass., and told his hearers of the position which those traditions hold in the field of education.

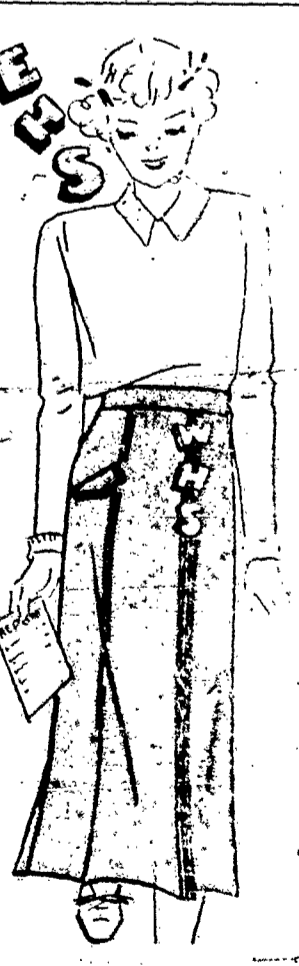
