

WHAT ARCHBISHOP MOONEY HAS SAID ABOUT SUPPORT FOR CATHOLIC COURIER

"FOR THE CATHOLICS OF THE DIOCESE OF ROCHESTER, THE CATHOLIC PRESS SHOULD MEAN FIRST OF ALL THE CATHOLIC COURIER. I AM HAPPY TO SAY THAT THE PAST YEAR HAS TO A NOTABLE DEGREE BROUGHT OUT THAT MEANING. DUE CHIEFLY TO THE GENEROUS EFFORTS OF THE MEMBERS OF THE DIOCESAN HOLY NAME UNION, THE CIRCULATION OF THE COURIER HAS HAD A SIGNIFICANT INCREASE.

"THE GOAL WE ARE AIMING AT IS TO PUT OUR DIOCESAN PAPER IN EVERY CATHOLIC HOME IN THE DIOCESE. TO MAKE A MATERIAL ADVANCE TOWARD THIS IDEAL WE NEED NOT ASK THAT OUR CATHOLIC PEOPLE MAKE AN ADDED OUTLAY OF FUNDS FOR READING MATTER BUT ONLY THAT THEY DIVIDE THE MONEY SPENT FOR THIS PURPOSE IN SUCH A WAY AS TO PROVIDE FOR AT LEAST A MINIMUM CATHOLIC CONTENT IN THEIR READING.

"WHAT A CONSOLING MANIFESTATION IT WOULD BE IF EVERYONE WHO CAN IN THIS WAY INCLUDE THE CATHOLIC COURIER IN THE READING MATTER WHICH HE PROVIDES FOR HIMSELF AND HIS FAMILY, WOULD COME FORWARD AND BECOME A SUBSCRIBER.

Archbishop Mooney in a pastoral letter January 30, 1935.

"IT HAS INDEED BEEN GRATIFYING TO LEARN OF THE PROGRESS WHICH THE CATHOLIC COURIER HAS MADE IN THE SHORT TIME THAT HAS ELAPSED SINCE ITS REORGANIZATION AND ADOPTION AS A DIOCESAN ORGAN.

"NOT WITHOUT SURPRISE DID I LEARN THAT THIS HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED WITHOUT ANY SIGNAL DISPLAY OF INDIVIDUAL GENEROSITY IN ITS FAVOR. THIS MUCH IS CERTAIN, HOWEVER, THAT THE HOPES AND PLANS OF MY BELOVED PREDECESSOR IN ITS REGARD, HOPES AND PLANS WHICH I HEARTILY MAKE MY OWN, CANNOT BE REALIZED UNLESS ITS CIRCULATION IS STILL FURTHER INCREASED.

"THIS IS NECESSARY EVEN IN A MATERIAL WAY TO ENHANCE ITS VALUE AS A MEDIUM OF PUBLICITY AND THUS INSURE THE PATRONAGE WHICH, AS A MATTER OF BUSINESS IS REQUIRED FOR ITS DEVELOPMENT. THIS IS NECESSARY IN A WIDER AND DEEPER SENSE TO MAKE IT MORE ADEQUATELY REPRESENTATIVE OF THE DIOCESE WHICH IT SERVES. I TRUST, THEREFORE, THAT THOSE INTO WHOM HOME THE COURIER DOES NOT NOW COME WILL GIVE ASSURANCE OF THEIR SUPPORT OF THIS IMPORTANT DIOCESAN ENTERPRISE.

"IN CONCLUSION, THEN, I EARNESTLY BESPEAK FOR THE CATHOLIC COURIER, THE UNITED AND GENEROUS SUPPORT OF OUR PRIESTS AND PEOPLE AND I FERVENTLY HOPE THAT IT MAY CARRY INTO EVERY HOME IN THE DIOCESE THE SALUTARY INFLUENCE OF THE CATHOLIC PRESS."
