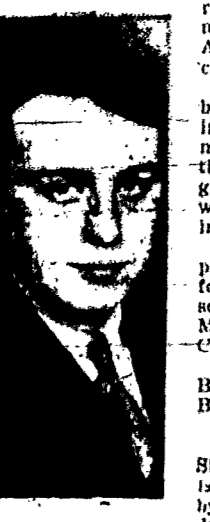
## KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS TOURISTS PLAN VISIT TO VATICAN PRESS EXHIBIT

New York (N.C.)—A visit to the World Catholic Press Exhibition to be held at the Vatican is a feature of the European mission tour sponsored by the New York Chapter of the Knights of Columbus, which sailed from this city on July 21. It has been announced here that the fourth annual tour, designed for a month's vacation, includes visits to important cities and resorts in France, Italy and Switzerland and pilgrimages to the shrines of Lourdes, Assisi and Fátima. The program also provides for extension trips to Belgium, Germany, England and Ireland for those having time for a longer stay abroad. The tour is being organized by the New York Chapter of the K. of C. in cooperation with the headquarters of the organization in Rome. 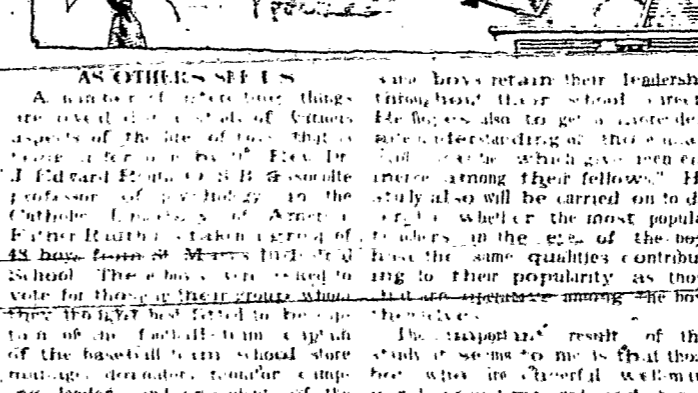
