Rural Life Session Scheduled In Fargo In Week of Oct. 11

Chicago (N.C.)—At an executive board meeting here the officers of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference fixed the week of October 11 as the date of the fourteenth annual convention of the organization in Fargo, N. D., at the invitation of the Most Rev. Alexander J. Muench, Bishop of Fargo. The Very Rev. William T. Mulloy, of Grifton, president of the Conference and director of the Fargo Rural Life Bureau, will be chairman of the local arrangements committee.

As part of an effort to engender a more extensive and intensive interest in rural living through the co-operation of Catholic grade and high-school teachers in agricultural districts, the board has created a committee to encourage the introduction of courses in rural economics and sociology in teacher training programs throughout the nation. The Rev. James A. Byrnes, Superintendent of Schools of the Archdiocese of St. Paul, is chairman of the newly formed committee. The other members are the Rev. Joseph H. Ostleick, Superintendent of Schools in the Diocese of Omaha, and the Rev. Leon A. McNell, Superintendent of Schools in the Diocese of Wichita.

RESEARCH IS GREAT NEED OF EUGENICS

New York (N.C.)—The crying need of eugenics as the American National Association Council for the Investigation of Sterility and Impaired Progeny, headed by Dr. Abraham Myerson, chairman, declares in a letter published in the New York Times.

There have been no researches which fully merit the term scientific, Dr. Myerson writes. The difficulties are great and they require a large organization with a scientific staff, especially controlled by a committee of experts of known repute. While a limited legislative program in our main recommendations is in the direction of non-interference, more thorough and more impartial research is recommended.

The recommendations of the committee, in essence, are given by Dr. Myerson as follows: 1. Further the research in eugenics, especially in the field of sterilization, by the use of only voluntary selective sterilization. 2. This should be recommended only to sterile individuals, not only by a scientific committee, but by a committee of laymen, and to individuals in the community at large. 3. This should be recommended only to those cases of sterility which are of a hereditary nature, but even here the sterilization should be recommended only after a thorough investigation has been made.

Case of Epilepsy

In a far from infrequent case reported here, a patient who is strongly opposed to any sterilization on the basis of eugenics, is found to be a sterile individual with an individual who has epilepsy. A committee of experts, after a thorough investigation, has recommended sterilization for social reasons because of the danger of transmitting the disease to other individuals in the community.
