AMICABLE FEELING BETWEEN ENGLAND AND IRELAND CITED

London, Relations between England and the Irish Free State are more amicable than they have been heretofore.

Archbishop Downey, who proposes the "Irish Free State" and J. W. Dulaney, high commissioner for the Free State in London, who reported, both stressed the importance of good relations between England and Ireland.

"The Greek states of old in their infancy," said the Archbishop, "Ireland is now consolidating itself. The Greeks of old laid down the principle that the first step to self-government is self-reliance."

"In the development of our national life we have no hostility to neighboring countries. The statements of some people that the formation of a new Irish government is dependent upon the influence of other countries who have hostile intentions toward Great Britain are irritating."

CHURCH CITED AS CURB ON AFRICAN RADICALISM

Kisumu, East Africa.—(N.C.W.C. Files)—A statement in the Annual Report of Native Affairs, in the Blue Book for 1934, which has just been published, says that the Catholic Church has acted as a bulwark against subversive propaganda among the natives of western Kenya, near Uganda.

"The location of West Kaka-mega, which comprises about three-quarters of the mining activity of the district," says the report, "has been little affected by subversive propaganda owing partly to the strong Roman Catholic element and to the personal interest of Chief Mulumu and the Bishop of Mombasa."

38-YEAR-OLD TOLEDO JESUIT COLLEGE TO CLOSE IN SEPTEMBER

Toledo O.—(NC)—St. John's College, 38-year-old institution of the Jesuit Fathers here will close next September it has been announced by the Most Rev. Karl J. Alter, Bishop of Toledo, and the Very Rev. Gerald Fitzgibbons S.J., president of the college.

Financial difficulties are given as the reason for the discontinuance of educational work. The present St. John's College and the Toledo Teachers' College will become one institution. The closing will also include the high school.

Bishop Alter pointed out that the closing of the college is felt by him personally since he was the first student to receive a degree from the institution.

In a letter to Father Fitzgibbons the Bishop expresses his sorrow over the necessity for the suspension of activities, paying tribute to the work of the Jesuits in connection with the college.

Father Fitzgibbons in a statement points out that every effort was made to avoid the necessity of closing.

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C. R. BARNES NAMED RECTOR OF CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY MOURNED BY KNIGHTS

Zeal and Service For K. C. Won Him High Esteem; Helped Start Many Councils

Baltimore (NC)—The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph M. Corrigan, noted educator and rector of the Theological Seminary of St. Charles Borromeo, Overbrook, Philadelphia, has been named by the Holy See to be rector of the Catholic University of America in Washington, D. C.

A pioneer member of the Order of Knights of Columbus through-out the state were saddened this week when word was received of the passing of Charles R. Barnes, 82, city railway commissioner, in St. Mary's Hospital, Monday April 8, following an illness of several months.

Mr. Barnes had accumulated a host of friends during his forty years of membership.

His untimely passing was a self-sacrificing work as a degree holder with the late John Delaney, he went throughout New York State and Pennsylvania instituting Knights of Columbus councils shortly after the Order was founded in New Haven.

As Grand Knight of Rochester Council in 1925 and 27 it was Charles R. Barnes who interested Richard T. Ford, John Connors and John P. Boyars in the Columbus Building and brought about plans for completion of that structure.

He was known as the "Grand Land Admiral" or "Charley" to members in all walks of life.

Reports reaching here indicate that the reaction to the representations made to Mexico City by this Government concerning what was charged in Congress to be radical activity involving Mexican consuls in this country.

Mexican consuls in the United States, the present understanding is, have abandoned participation in the Confederation of Mexican and Mexico-American Laborers, announced as an organization to educate and "socially advance" Mexican nationals.
