lands, until to build an empire, and whose place was providentially given to the Anglo-Saxon emperors." The printer made me say "friends" and barbarians."

This is one example, out of very many in all languages, which shows what a great difference there may be in the meaning of two words that in spelling differ but by one letter. By the omission of one letter, or by the addition of one letter, or word we assume not only a different, but even a contrary meaning. This is made evident in the meaning of the two words friend and friend.

Some time ago I was reading an article by "a learned professor" in which he made many over the fact that in the early days of the Church a long and heated controversy was carried on by ecclesiastics, Bishops and Monks, over two words which differed only by one letter and the latter the smallest in the Greek Alphabet, namely, the letter "I". But the professor's argument over the simplicity of the Bishops and Monks of the 4th Century shows only his own ignorance. The question at issue was in reality the very fundamental central truth of the Christian religion: Whether Christ is God or only godlike. Until quite recently all Christians, with the exception of a few sects, numerically insignificant, such as the Unitarians, believed in the Divinity of Christ, namely, that Christ is very still has millions of adherents and the Monophysites. The orthodox Catholic doctrine is as it is that Christ is true God and true Man in that in the Incarnation He assumed complete human nature, human body and human soul both created and both united to the Divine Word, the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity, by what is called the hypostatic union, from which follows that this same person is true God and True Man.

Called "Orthodox."

The Monophysites taught and teach that in Christ there is but one nature. In explaining their doctrine they are vague and contradictory, the result, as it is in our own times, of not recognizing any authority established by Christ himself to define what is true or false and to end all controversy. These Monophysites who for racial and political reasons hated the Byzantines, the Greek Emperors at Constantinople, and the Greeks at the time, those who accepted the decisions of the Council which condemned the heresy were in the East called Orthodox. In the Armenian Church we have in our own times an illustration of how this racial and national denomination finally prevails "Anglican" is but a camouflaged name for "English". When Constantine also fell away from Catholic unity all those who followed the Byzantine schism continued to be called "Orthodox" and the name of the Council by which the Christians of all those sixteen nations, either racial or racial or "Eastern" Churches are called today.

I have said that those things should be of interest to us here at home, and for several reasons. In the world-wide we are now coming to realize nothing of these separated Christians of the Near East, the Balkan peninsula, Syria, Palestine and Egypt. Then our Oriental press began to explain them. The "Literary Digest" in particular began to publish special numbers on the subject for use in High Schools, Colleges and Academies. There was another reason that lent interest to the subject. Beginning with the last decades of the last century a considerable number of these Eastern Christians began to emigrate to the United States and spread over the country. A large number of these are Catholics, but I call them "Orthodox" and the same names as the "Orthodox" or other Schismatics. Hence arose and still persists considerable confusion. We should be on our guard in these matters, and especially should we have correct ideas to guide us in dealing with them. There is not space left here now to enter into detailed explanations. It will be worth while to return to the subject. For the present, just a few headlines:

**Easter-Rites**

1. In all these Eastern countries there are Catholics and Schismatics using the same rite. In the early ages the whole racial or national group went into Schism and remained for centuries in Schism chiefly for the reasons mentioned before their hatred of the domination of Byzantium. When that domination passed away from the Moslem Conquests these Christians became isolated, cut off from the possibility of direct free communication with the center of Catholic Unity. In later times still, when Moslem domination became weakened, French and Italian Missionaries especially自由地去 among them; numbers of these people saw their error and renounced their Schisms. Hence we have today Catholic Armenians, Catholic Syrians, Catholic Copts, all of whom use the same rites as they did in Schism and as their forefathers did before the Schism.

For the past few weeks there has been appearing in "America" a very curious series of articles on "Monophysite Eastern Christians." In these articles Father Donnelly describes several Catholic churches in Manhattan that belong to one or the other of the Eastern Rites. These people are, of course, as much Catholic as we are; but they use

**WHO SHALL TEACH?**

This therefore is the thought that occurs to me if the schools are not teaching the youth of both our nations that Christ was born on the first Christmas Day, that He suffered to release mankind and was ignorantly murdered on the first Good Friday by the people He came to save that He showed His triumph over death by rising from His sepulchre on the first Easter Day and that on the first Whitsun He gave His commission to His apostles to preach to men of all tongues.

I repeat, if the schools do not teach these truths to the boys and girls who tomorrow will do the work which you and I are doing to-day, who is going to teach them?

Not the newspapers except the Catholic ones which of course many will not see. Not books especially. Not the stage. Certainly not the movies. Not the clerical magazines the people to be reached do not go to church.

Perhaps to some extent the radio will help. In Great Britain, where the State holds the reins of all broadcasting, religious programs are rationed, and although we get approximately our share the subject matter of religious broadcasts has to be limited strictly to non-controversial matter.

**INDIVIDUAL RESPONSIBILITY**

So it comes to this. It is up to you and to me as individuals in contact with the masses of the people who do not know the first thing about Christianity. These people are not anti-Christian. They are merely non-Christian. Some of us need few of them. Some need many more. And there are some Catholics whose lives are spent almost entirely in contact with the non-Christian atmosphere.

A good way to test your possible usefulness in sowing the seed of instruction is, I think, this. How much were you shocked by the ignorance of the London schoolboy who did not know the meaning of "Good Friday"? If you were not shocked at all it means that you are constantly up against people of the type. Therefore your opportunity is great.

If you were badly shocked by the thought that anybody in a Christian country should know so little about Christ then your life must be excluded from your list of non-Christians which are very largely Catholics. Then your opportunity will be less great unless you join a Catholic organization such as the Catholic Evidence Guild which makes the dissemination of Catholic truth its objective.

Things go on as they are going. One thing is certain in the next generation the world away from the shores of which is Catholic will know less about God and will know less, therefore, of God's commandments that it knows now, and will thus go to pieces with increasing rapidity.

The boys who today think Good Friday is in commemoration of a public holiday have lost contact with every source which is likely to tell them otherwise unless you and I do our best to teach them.

It is a great service to your business to teach them.
