French missionary martyr, "The Story of Maryknoll," "Thoughts from Modern Maryknoll," "Stories from the Field Afar," "Field Afar Tales" and "Our Servants in the Orient." In 1910 he met Father Price at the Eucharistic Congress in Montreal. They shared ideas concerning an American foreign mission society and resolved to launch it. When they appeared before the United States Congress in session in Washington and secured its advocacy of their undertaking and its approval of their placing the plan before the Holy See.

In 1911 the two priests went to Rome and on June 29, 1911, received official permission to start their society. On the following day Pope Plus XI named them and blessed the new organization.

Organized Work Is Orient
The society's headquarters for a short time were at Hawthorne, N.Y. Then the present property here was acquired. The society received in 1918 its Decretal Letters from the Holy See. In the sixth year of the society's existence Bishop Walsh had the Orient to arrange for a field of labor for his missionaries. A brother of South China was dedicated upon, and the Pope assigned the same to the young society. After seven months in Asia, Bishop Walsh returned to Maryknoll and the society's first mission band headed by Father Price left for the Orient.
