

Record Smashing Performances Climax Pin Tourney

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Roth Piles Up 710; Winners Divide \$667

Three Teams Break 3,000 Mark In High Scoring Sprees; Out-of-Town Teams Make Good Showing; Call Meeting To Select Next Year's Tourney Site

With every possible high scoring record shattered to bits, the Fourth Annual Holy Name Tournament of the Catholic Men's Bowling Association is drawing down the curtain at Elm Hall tonight.

Never in Holy Name Tournament history have the maples taken such a terrific pounding in the quest for the \$667 in prize money. The Loyella's score of 4132 on opening night and Wittman's 706 total proved to be the tip offs on the scores for the duration of the tournament.

Odenbach's Click
Odenbach came within an ace of overtaking the Loyella Tuesday night when they spilled the maples for 3085, a score that would win four out of five ordinary tournaments.

The most brilliant individual performance of the tournament up to Wednesday evening was turned in by Roth who hung up a 710 total after starting the evening with a 278. Art Schuch of the Holy Redeemer squad clipped the wood to 276 in the 11 Division.

Auburn Fares Well
The visiting firemen came from Auburn, Corning, Elmira, Owego and points east over the week end and bagged a fair share of the prize money. The Georgetown team of Auburn scattered the pins for 2777 to take a firm grip on first place in the 11 Division.

At the end of the first week of pinning, a team had to shoot upwards of 2020 to crash the first ten in the 11 division and more than 2020 to get in the charmed circle in the 12 class.

Secretary Joe Mueller announced that a total of 147 teams rolled in the tournament. This is twenty less than last year's record entry of 167.

Within the next few weeks a meeting of all participating teams will be held to elect officers for the coming year and select a tournament site for 1937.

The weatherman permitting, the Catholic Baseball League is scheduled to get underway for the 1936 season Friday evening on six city diamonds.

This year's schedule is the first in Catholic League history that will be played at twilight. What the chances are for success of this undertaking only time will tell.

If the Catholic Baseball League ever deserved the support of the clergy and laity, it does so this year.

Veterans Of Future Wars Analyzed

Viewed As 'Silly,' 'Stupid' And 'Humorous,' 'Auxiliary' Seen In Same Light' By Critics; Termed 'A Deep, Basic Problem Confronting Mankind'

There seems to be considerable confusion as to whether one should laugh or be indignant at that strange organization known as the Veterans of Future Wars, recently founded at Princeton University and reported to be spreading like the proverbial wild fire to the campuses of other American colleges and universities.

The Veterans of Future Wars decried for this daring to depreciate the valor and patriotism of American future soldiers.

Urges Fascist Salute
Oswald Garrison Villard, book and associate editor of the National Civic Review, speaking at the national meeting of the Veterans of Future Wars at Princeton, yesterday made a trip abroad to enjoy the thrill and exaltation of seeing the probable future resting places of their sons, who will sacrifice themselves in the next war.

Well, what is to be done about this peculiar and repulsive? Dr. Marie Carroll speaking at the national meeting of the Catholic Peace Association for International Peace pointed out that many regarded the Veterans of Future Wars as a 'log' on the face of American life.

When one considers that this lineup of officers practically started from scratch and built up an entry of 147 teams from all sections of the state, you must admit they've done a grand job — one which has earned them the gratitude of every Catholic bowler in this area.

Teams from Auburn, Elmira, Endicott and Bradford, Pa., came to town over the weekend, bowled on three Sunday shifts and grabbed a fair share of the prize money. The boys had such a good time that they've promised to return next year with reinforcements.
