On Sunday March 1, with the coming of slightly milder weather, Father O'Brien had arisen in the early morning to start the furnace. The furnace had not been working for a year. His other assistant where he offered the first Mass. It was at 7:30 that he came to his room, flamed by a morning wind and had completely destroyed both church and home by the time Father O'Brien returned. A defect in the flue was believed to have caused the fire against which the Draper parishioners were helpless. The next day the ashes were sifted and from the ruins came just the few mentioned above. Mrs. Madigan Says: Luxuries Causing Marriage Slump By GERTRUDE D. MADIGAN "Dear Mrs. Madigan: As a college woman with experience in the business world and in the home, let me state why so many girls are not marrying today. The two main reasons are: (1) The lowered moral standard, and (2) the increasing use of luxuries. Girls are being placed in the business world far too young. Many of them are mere babies and have no right to wander so far away from mother. Our education has raised the age limit several years but it must be remembered that the world today is not the same as it was ten years ago. Morals are low, the ebbs and flows are far better for our girls never knew this world. Jobs Defeat Marriage Job-getting takes away a girl's best years. Those years in which she might settle herself successfully for life. It defers marriage and that is not a healthy sign. Sorry to say, much you meet in the business world don't marry you. There is no such thing as a raincoat to be found there, and an eight-hour-a-day job does not widen a girl's social circle. So many business women do not have an opportunity to meet an eligible man. There is a tremendous element involved in marriage for women, and so she cannot neglect her opportunities. It is quite a common thing today to find a Catholic girl of 24 not yet thinking of marriage. This may be called 'drifting' but it is not unusual. And I have found many parents well-versed in the art of raising their children who think their daughters not too young to take a job at 18 but far too young to marry at 22. Now if these ideas were reversed, we'd have a happier state of affairs. Luxuries Play Part Luxuries play a large part in the problem of marriage. As luxuries increase, marriages and babies decrease. This was ever the rule, because there is a certain catering to the body that softens the mind. In the good old days, even a college family lived more or less according to religious rules. This was necessary if you wanted to establish your family on a solid firm foundation. But today there are many Catholic families who feel that if they do not have the latest luxuries they are living their lives right here on earth. Consequently, even children must work to pay the bills. In the worst days of the depression it was not unusual for a young working girl to spend a good deal of her salary for lunch with resultant damage to her health and in the event of marriage probable detriment to offspring. Should Have \$1,000 Our Divine Lord could never be so exacting as the god of luxury. I have found in families where the women have not married that the family expenses are far too high. It is difficult to say just what constitutes a luxury. But there is a safe rule applied to all successful accomplishments and that is that every person ought to have \$1,000 cash on hand ready for an emergency. Without this a person simply courts failure, and everything is a luxury for the individual who has not that sum of money on hand and not invested. Young girls not only have no money today but they expect to assume a huge debt upon marriage. The exploitation of women's salaries is beyond all sense of honesty. There is no value received and women are simply supporting a group of men who do not want to work but want to be idle. Consequently, it is not unusual to hear our so-called best citizen advising us to follow a path that will lead to our destruction all this with an eye on our pay envelopes. My advice is either to marry or to enter a religious Order. Don't drift from job to job. You will find it is not so easy to do when you get older.
