

Many Degrees Awarded By Catholic Colleges

With the advent of June commencement exercises in many Catholic colleges and universities held throughout the nation, the week hundreds of scholars received their degrees, while other students were awarded postgraduate and other advanced degrees. Honorary degrees were conferred upon distinguished persons in various fields of life, while addresses to graduates were given by other prelates, business and educational spheres.

NOTRE DAME The value of education to good citizenship was cited yesterday afternoon by Dr. William J. Mann, rector of the University of Notre Dame at the commencement address to the graduates of the University of Notre Dame at exercises held at the university.

BROOKLYN, N. Y. Diplomas were awarded Wednesday to 14 graduates of St. John's University here at annual commencement exercises. The Most Rev. Raymond A. Kearney, Auxiliary Bishop of Brooklyn, presided at the ceremonies and the address to the graduates was delivered by Senator Francis T. Mahoney of Connecticut.

CINCINNATI The Rev. Samuel Knox Wilson, S.J., president of Loyola University, Chicago, delivered the address to the graduates of the commencement exercises of Xavier University here on Wednesday. The Rev. Dennis F. Byrne, president of Xavier, presented the degrees.

BOSTON The Rev. Dr. Charles A. Hart, assistant professor of Philosophy at the Catholic University of America, received the honorary degree, Doctor of Laws, at the annual commencement exercises at St. Victor's College here Tuesday. Dr. Hart also delivered the commencement address to the graduates.

ST. LOUIS At its one hundred and eighteenth commencement exercises on Tuesday, St. Louis University conferred degrees upon 366 graduates. The Most Rev. John J. Glennon, Archbishop of St. Louis, presided.

VILLANOVA, PA. Degrees were awarded to 135 graduates of Villanova University here.

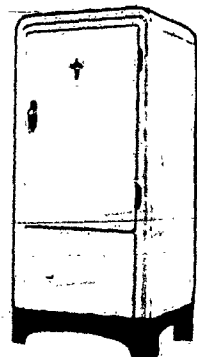
