15 BRANCHES ARE LOCATED IN ROCHESTER

Nuns, Seminarians, High School and College Girls Are Teachers

More than 2000 students attended the opening sessions of the forty-five religious vacation schools in the Rochester diocese this week.

Fifteen of the vacation schools are located in the city of Rochester, an increase of eight over last year.

These schools, with a registration of 1205, are under the direction of the Rev. John M. Duffy, diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and the Religious Staff.

The twenty-five schools in the rural areas are under the general supervision of the Rev. John M. Ball of Lima, Diocesan Director, National Catholic Rural Life Bureau.

A vacation school has been opened at St. Francis De Sales in Geneva under the direction of the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Walter J. Lee, V. F. S. C.

The schools throughout the diocese are staffed by Sisters of Notre Dame, Sisters of Mercy and Sisters of St. Joseph, Trinitarian Sisters, and other religious orders.

Besides these teachers, WPA workers are engaged in some curricular in teaching handcraft, wood carving, sewing and tap dancing.

Rochester Schools. Of the fifteen schools in Rochester, three are at Merrimack Center, the Cathedral, Holy Family, Mt. Read Boulevard, Annunciation and St. Anthony's have been in existence for a number of years.

The new schools are located at the Chapel of the Precious Blood, Sacred Heart, St. Francis Assisi, St. Peter and Paul's, St. Andrew's, St. Michael's, St. Monica's, St. Anne's and St. Lucy's.

The term which started Monday comprises a half day session each day for four weeks.

The girls who volunteered for this work attended the Confraternity training school at Holy Rosary School last month. They are assisting in the religious instruction of the children.

Expect C.Y.O. Bouts To Draw 50,000

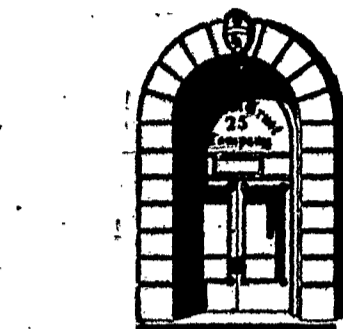
