Mexican Prelate Defends Clergy In First Pastoral Letter

Mexico City—The first pastoral of the Most Rev. Jose Garibi y Rivera, Archbishop of Guadalajara, on the problems of the moment and the evils that afflict the Church in Mexico.

Archbishop Garibi declares that "no all has been lost" saying "we have a clergy worthy of reverence" a clergy that, in its immense majority, is filled with the apostolic spirit, is united with its ordinary and united among its members, a clergy that doubtless has defects since it is composed of men, but that is filled with abnegation, suffers patiently and is faithful to the Commission it has received from Christ.

He says he affirms these statements "at a time when priests have been and soon heaped upon them by the enemies of Christ, when their minor defects are stressed before society, and when daily the blackest calumnies are launched against them."

Deprived of Necessities The present persecution in Mexico the Archbishop admits, has "elements sufficient to bring about the dissolution of the clergy if we relied only on human means and acts without the special, a very special, action of Divine Providence."

He is deprived of intimate communication with other priests and obstacles are placed in the way of practicing every known means of sanctification. He frequently has to seek refuge in closets and in prison his virtue is subjected to the severest tests, because he is obliged to hear and to witness repugnant things.
