BETTER HOUSING MEANS BETTER HOMES

IMPORTANCE OF PLUMBING IN NEW HOME IS STRESSED

Plumbing in the present-day house is as important and necessary as the floors or walls. No house can be considered to meet the requirements of modern living standards that does not include a kitchen sink, a complete bathroom, and an adequate supply of hot water. This piping of fixtures should be carefully studied and specified as any other part of the house. The location of the main soil stack should be shown on the plan and a wall thickness provided sufficient to contain it. A 4-inch soil line that is needed where a toilet is installed, cannot be contained in wall made of 4-inch studs. Unless a wall with 6-inch studs is provided, the soil line must be boxed in either with wood or with lath and plaster. This makes a break in the wall that in many cases could have been avoided by proper planning. Sometimes this box can be placed in a closet where it is not objectionable.
