**BETTER HOUSING MEANS BETTER HOMES**

**CEILING HEIGHT SHOWN FACTOR IN BEAUTY AND SIZE OF ROOMS**

Installation of an attractive beamed ceiling reduces the suggestion of the height in high-ceilinged rooms.

The size and location of electric fixtures influences appearance, size and ceiling height in a room. Small ceiling and wall fixtures are preferable in small rooms.

Pictures moldings fastened to walls where they join the ceiling heighten the wall effect, while on the other hand, low moldings decrease wall height. Likewise narrow baseboards and other trim increase the appearance of wall height and size of a room.

Wainscoting or broad panels in a paneled room tend to decrease the appearance of height of walls while narrow panels or vertical sheathing tend to increase the appearance of wall height.

The size, number, and arrangement of pictures and the height at which they are hung influence the appearance of size. Normally, a large number of pictures or large pictures should be avoided in small rooms. Pictures placed comparatively high on the wall seem to lower the ceiling height.

Wallpaper with vertical stripes tends to increase the effect, while on the other hand, large patterns in the wallpaper often tend to decrease the effect of ceiling height.

The choice of color in either wallpaper or paint can be used very effectively in influencing the appearance of the size of a room. Dark shades tend to make a room look smaller, light shades make a room look larger. Care should be taken not to use too bright a color over large areas. Colors, of course, should be considered not only in connection with floors, walls and ceilings, but also in connection with the color of curtains, drapes, rugs, and furniture. It is also important in connection with the color of trim and any painted borders or stenciling.
