Sodality Conducts First of Summer Action School

BOSTON (N.C.)—The first in the sixth annual series of Summer Schools of Catholic Action sponsored by the Sodality of Our Lady closed at Boston College, Saturday. An attendance close to 1,000 surprised expectations. Particular interest was displayed in the courses on "Consumers' Co-operation" under the direction of the Rev. George A. McDonald, S.J. Next Monday, August 24, the six-day institute will open at the College of St. Francis Xavier, in New York City. The regular staff of the Sodality will be supplemented by professors from the Catholic colleges of the city. Special attention will be paid the courses on government at this time, for New York City will vote on November 3 on the question of a charter change. This charter revision would include provisions for election of the aldermanic board by proportional representation, and a special course in this method of election will be offered by the Rev. Edward Dowling, S.J. The schools will be held in Chicago at Providence High School from August 31 to September 6. Delegates and visitors to this always interesting and important meeting, together with thousands throughout the country unable to be present but following its deliberations from afar, will wish to know something of the history, extraordinary progress and present position of the National Council of Catholic Women of this progressive southern state. Texas is celebrating the hundredth anniversary of its independence, won from Mexico on April 21, 1836 in the gallant victory over General Santa Anna, on the San Jacinto battlefield. Previous to that time the Mexican government had secularized all the Church property. The Franciscans abandoned their monasteries. The churches, some of them beautiful edifices, as evidenced in the few that are preserved, were left to fall into ruin. For years, no Mexican bishop had crossed the Rio Grande. A few itinerant priests gave scattered and scant religious consolation. Truly Texas presented a case where the shepherd was struck and the flock dispersed. This sad condition came to the
