## Keep Children Free From Radical Ideals, Says Priest-Educator

Annual Diocesan Teachers Conference Told Duty To Divert Young From Communism to Catholic Church; 700 Teachers at Sessions

It is the duty of those who believe in God to do their utmost in rescuing the young from the muddy stream of Communism and in directing them to the stream leading to the Catholic Church, declared the Rev. Edward M. Estowski, professor of tomistics at St. Joseph's Seminary, Dunwoodie, in the opening address of the 32nd annual teachers' conference of the diocese, Friday, at Aquinas Institute.

The conference which was attended by over 700 teachers representing the Sisterhoods of St. Joseph, Mercy, Notre Dame, Franciscan and Trinitarian was an all-day affair with general and sixteen sectional meetings.

ward Mooney spoke at the closing session in the afternoon. The Archbishop urged special effort be made in instructing the duller pupils and that all possible be done to make the children boosters for their own schools. He congratulated all who had a part in conducting religious vacation schools in the diocese.

Counters "Red" Ideals Unless the little Red School House is to take on a different and more dangerous meaning, Father Estowski said, teachers who are aware of their social responsibility and must bravely strive to develop upright citizens for the state who are not possessed of radical ideals than others would instill in them.

Two-Fold Purpose The noted educator stressed the importance of bringing God to men by means of the Sacraments and of bringing men to God by preaching and teaching which offer an occasion for grace. It is the duty of Catholic educators, he said, to try to convert those outside the Catholic Church. The Rev. Philip J. Furlong, professor of Catholic College, New York City, and author of "History of America," said "Growth of industries and super-corporations fostered in part by the necessities of the World War, unemployment, droughts, and floods which split over state lines have brought a sharp trend towards centralization of government. If we are to understand the movements, stirring the tide of our lives, these are the subjects we must study in our schools."

## APPEAL WIDE IN FALL STUDY CLUB'S TOPIC

"Because of its universal appeal, the Life of Christ promises to be an ideal subject for the Fall sessions of the study clubs in the Diocese," it was declared in a statement issued at the diocesan offices in the Columbus Building of the Conference of Christendom, Doctrine and Discipline sponsoring the study club movement.

The topic offers Catholics of every age and education an opportunity to become intimately acquainted with the Divine Personality of Jesus Christ through practical study of the Gospel story. To Enlist Men Special effort will be made this year to enroll many more men in discussion study clubs.

"The Life of Christ" should prove to be of deep interest to our Catholic men at a time when His answer to social problems is most needed," said the statement. "The readjustment of our social order looks for its solution ultimately in the thought of the people. This study of the Life of Christ aims to direct the thinking of our Catholic laymen toward a deep conviction of the fundamental truths of Christianity and the absolute need of their practical application today."

Has Wide Range The pamphlet is suitably adapted for use by boys and girls of high school age, yet it is so flexible as to admit a deeper study on the part of more mature minds and those of higher educational level.

The text has been conveniently divided into sixteen chapters, eight to be studied during the Fall sessions and the remainder during the Spring session in Lent. Sessions will begin in the Fall during the first week in October and continue for eight weeks. Competent Leaders Needed Success of a study club depends to a great extent on the selection of competent leaders who are thoroughly familiar with the procedure of the discussion club and the text. Parishes that reported for last year, an exceptionally large number of study clubs meeting regularly, revealed that this was due to the appointment of capable parish chairmen.

Throughout the last three weeks of September meetings of all study clubs in the diocese, in Rochester and the deanery centers on two consecutive nights. The Rev. John M. Duffy, diocesan director and the Rev. Charles J. Mahoney, associate diocesan director of the Confraternity will discuss with the leaders at these meetings lessons in the new text and the best method of procedure for the coming sessions in October.

## DOOMED BISHOP FLEES SPANISH REDS DISGUISED AS PEASANT

(Continued from Page 1) states that with Bishop Lapanz y Leguano of Guetoc many seminarians were shot by Government forces. The correspondent for La Croix, Paris Catholic daily, at the Spanish frontier reports that in the little village of Guzman, near Madrid, where the Christian Brothers had a novitiate, Brother Santiago was among the Religious executed. Brother Santiago was held in high esteem because of the courage and abnegation he displayed when Las Maravillas College was burned on May 11, 1931. His courage had won the respect of the rabble. The same correspondent reports that the famed chemist, the Rev. Eduardo Vitorica, was among the seven Jesuits killed at Barcelona.

## Funeral of Martyr Bishop Is Described

PARIS—A correspondent reports to La Croix from Pamplona, Spain, an account of the funeral at Leoles of the Most Rev. Eustaquio Nieto y Marañon, Bishop of Leones, who was burned alive by the Reds. His story was obtained from Luis Blasco del Cacho, color-bearer of the 18th Infantry Regiment, who was in Leoles at the time. "The whole village stood about the burned house," he said, "while four officers removed the charred remains of the venerated prelate. When the remains appeared, the crowd shouted 'Viva Espana!' "With slow steps a cortege of a thousand people followed the remains to the cemetery, reciting the Holy Rosary as they went. Soldiers and civilians filed past the grave.

## Nazi Allow Reading Papal Encyclicals With Reservations

AMSTERDAM—(NC)—A German Catholic publisher recently put on the market a complete collection of the Encyclicals promulgated by Pope Pius XI, the reigning Holy Father. The official Nazi supervisory organ for all literary production in Germany, the Reichsstelle zur Förderung deutschen Schrifttums, has now come out with the official statement that this book can be recommended "only with reservations." All other Catholic books mentioned in this list are labeled "not to be recommended."
