

Board Aids Parish Schools In Michigan

Ordinary Approves Continuing Plan Effected By Pastors With Lake Linden School Board; Arrangement Saves Schools From Closing

LAKE LINDEN, MICH.—As a consequence of the economic depression, the pastor of St. Joseph's parish here found himself on the verge of losing his parochial school. When the school board was organized, the pastor was not given the parochial school would be closed and his 200 pupils would have to attend for the local public school.

Rochester Man Selected on Important Committee At San Antonio

Special to CATHOLIC COURIER—San Antonio.—With His Excellency, the Most Rev. Leopoldo Ruiz Flores, Apostolic Delegate to Mexico, celebrating Solemn Pontifical Mass in San Fernando Cathedral, the convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America and National Catholic Women's Union was officially launched here.

Among the 3,000 delegates from more than 30 states and San Antonio Catholics present are three from Rochester, N. Y.; the Rev. Joseph H. Gaffey, spiritual director of the National Catholic Women's Union branch; former Judge Philip H. Donnelly of the Central Verein branch, and Miss Laura K. Schilling, secretary of the N.C.W.U. branch in New York State.

Departing from a traditional policy, the Central Verein on Saturday night voted Judge Donnelly a member of the Committee on Catholic Action. This is the first time that anyone not of German extraction has been selected as a member of that important committee.

Tribute was paid by Frederick F. Kunkel, director of the Central Verein to the part taken by Judge Donnelly in the organization since 1916.

Judge Donnelly addressed the Executive Committee of the men's and women's organization, Saturday evening on "Our Need for Leadership—Means—Methods."

Delegates here were greatly interested in Archbishop Rula, Apostolic Delegate to Mexico, who is very active, despite his age.

Bertron at the Solemn Pontifical Mass was followed by the Most Rev. Jerome Droganetz, D.D., Archbishop of San Antonio, inveighing against conditions in the world at the present time. Archbishop Droganetz, the Central Verein and Catholic Women's Union to fulfill "our aim which is the highest—to save the world that has thrust God from itself—a world of hate, sin, crime and greed." "The next step in the world into one in which Christ is honored," he added.

Asking, is it not true that radical atheism is rampant in our country? "The archbishop urged his hearers to imitate the Communists, who enlist youth at an early age in their organization, thus ensuring leaders for the future of the movement."

Among outstanding speakers were the Most Rev. Aloysius J. Muench, Bishop of Fargo, in the afternoon and the Most Rev. Joseph F. Rummel, Archbishop of New Orleans, in the evening at Sunday's session.

Bishop Muench urged that Catholics must be persuaded of the efficacy of the truths of justice and charity "on which alone a program of social reconstruction can be based," that seal to put these truths into action will follow from this conviction; that impressing these persuasions and convictions on others is the next step in the program; that all the agencies of propaganda should be enlisted in the cause; press, school, radio, discussion clubs, lectures, and that the development of leaders to have the trail of reconstruction is essential.

learned many serious lessons. The first, he said, is that as things are now the very foundations of all order, all culture, all civilization are being directly threatened, and ignorance of religion, unfortunately, does not permit the ill-informed masses to perceive the danger. On the other hand, Pope Pius added, the herds of the forces of subversion, by means of insidious dissensions, strive to attract to themselves some indulgent and ill-prepared Catholics in favor of an unchanging program of hate and destruction.

Another lesson learned, the Holy Father said, is that if the hatred of the forces of subversion is particularly directed against the Catholic Church it is because the one and only real obstacle to the work of destruction is Christian teaching and the Church of Our Lord Jesus Christ. He said, wherever and in whatever manner the Catholic Church is being hindered and attacked, this, in the final analysis, is for no other reason than to favor the forces of destruction and disintegration.

Declaring that it cannot be said, as some have dared to say, that the Catholic Church has shown herself incapable of preventing the horrors and ruin of revolution, the Holy Father recalled the words of St. Basil: "There is no need to have recourse to example to justify the Church, it is enough to look at her teachings."

In fact, Pope Pius continued, could these teachings have full diffusion and complete application in society every form of welfare would certainly be assured. He added, because the Church adds to her teachings adequate spiritual aid to the practice of them, opposition, intrigues and resistance which have their source, unfortunately, in the weakness and bad will of men.

One flight of the Holy Father's mind, when he thought of the influence on the family and on youth and society is hindered in every possible manner, when the Catholic Press is completely suppressed, and every liberty is reserved for the press which seems to have determination to confound ideas, to defame the Church and even to proclaim new religions and new societies.

Considering all other considerations, His Holiness said he wished to give his Benediction to all those present, to all their suffering, to all their pain and in honor of God and of religion, which is to say the rights and dignity of conscience, prime condition of all human and civil welfare. This is a difficult and dangerous task, His Holiness said, for no other reason than because the ardor and difficulty of the defense may easily make it excessive and sometimes intentions that are partisan and less right can cloud and

Outdoor Organ Music Features Holy Name Meet

NEW YORK.—Dr. Melchior Mauro-Capone, organist in the New York Philharmonic Society and organist and choir master of St. Mary's Church, New London, Conn., has been appointed organist of the National Convention and Rally of the Holy Name Society at Randall's Island Stadium, Sept. 17 to 20. It was announced by the Very Rev. Thomas F. Conlon, O.P., National Director of the Holy Name Society.

This will mark the first time that organ music will be used at a large Catholic outdoor religious meeting. Through the use of the new Hammond organ, music comparable to that of the big cathedrals will be made possible outdoors.

The Hammond organ has been appointed the official organ of the great rally and the public demonstration of the fact that outdoor organ music is possible will hold great interest for the hundreds of clergy who will attend the service. Sixteen large amplifiers will be installed to carry the music throughout the Stadium which is expected to hold 250,000 persons for these services.

The singing will be led by the new Hammond organ of New York Vested Boy's Choir, directed by Constantino Yon, it was further announced.
