They must have been great and nobie and courag-Money was not abounding his promise to the German Cath. yet they must have their own place of worship regardless of material prosperity.

Father Prost speaks in superla tive terms of his parishioners. Their contributions not only supplied him with the means of livelihood but in a short time reduced a large per-tion of the church debt. This is necessary item in establishing a church and parish but in this case t seems to have taken a secondary place.

What rejoiced the heart of the new pastor was the complete harmony that existed among his flock and the esteem in which they held him. Despite the fact that there ex isted a system in those days that could be the source of bitter contention between a paster and his people. Trusteeism was introduced into the Church in the United States by Archbishop Carroll "to harmonize the outward administration of church property with the democratic principles on which our Jovernment is founded."

Ideally, Trusteelsm was perfect but when put into practice it gave rise to serious abuses and contentions. Father Prost has this to say of the men who held the deeds to his little edifice: "The Trustees were upright and trustworthy men,
