60,000 Holy Name Men Hear Cardinal Hayes

(Continued from Page 1) Holy Name Society, presided.

This afternoon was given over to a dozen individual meetings in which papers on various phases of the Holy Name Society and Catholic Action were presented.

The Very Rev. Michael J. Reddy, Assistant General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference; the Rev. E. A. Brogan, of Richmond; the Rev. E. A. Stauder, Rochester; the Rev. Joseph E. Maguire, Buffalo; the Rev. H. J. Waterson, Newark; the Rev. James M. Delaney, Pittsburgh; and the Rev. Joseph A. Daly, New York, presided at some of these meetings.

Cardinal Hayes was visibly affected by the demonstration. His voice, choking with emotion, he said it was "a moment of joy for him to see such a multitude come to honor the name of Jesus."

Father McDermott Speaks The Very Rev. T. S. McDermott, O. P., Provincial of the Dominican Fathers, reminded the delegates that the Holy Name Society had been founded 82 years ago today to combat almost the same type of irreligion that is rampant in the world.

He spoke of the long, honorable history of the Society and said it stands now as it stood then, for all that is fine and worthwhile in life.

Expressing deep concern over irreligious tendencies in the youth of today, Deputy Police Commissioner Byrnes MacDonald, said he firmly believed that religious instruction should be an integral part of every child's life, to combat present anti-religious, anti-social and anti-moral influences in the United States.

Commissioner MacDonald represented Mayor LaGuardia, who was away from the city on business. The delegates were welcomed to the rally by Francis X. Stephens, executive chairman of the New York Archdiocesan Holy Name Union.

A colorful procession of prelates, clergy and distinguished guests opened the rally. Bearing a color band of American and Papal flags, the worthy Deacon Knights of Columbus acted as guard of honor, together with a detachment of police, and led the procession. After there came about 200 Dominicans, Holy Cross Fathers, Augustinians, Carmelites, Redemptorists, Benedictines, Franciscans and other Order and Diocesan priests.

The two Cardinals and Archbishop Gleason, occupied thronos on the altar, which was banked with ferns and flowers and over which was suspended an heroic figure of the crucified Christ.

Other members of the hierarchy, monsignors and clergy sat in groups according to their rank. The male choir of St. Vincent Ferrer's Church, directed by Constantino Von, furnished music for the service.

An impressive message which expressed the desire of His Holiness Pope Pius XI "to speak to them from his heart as if he were among them," was read to the thousands of delegates present at the opening of the convention.

The Holy Father's message was read at the solemn Pontifical Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral with which the convention was opened yesterday morning. Cardinal Hayes presided at the Mass. The Most Rev. Stephen J. Longeneck, Auxiliary Bishop of New York, was the celebrant.
