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Reviews St. Joseph Parish's 100 Years

(Leading up to the Centenary of St. Joseph's Church, Franklin Street, Rochester, to be celebrated in October, a series of articles, third of which appears below, are being presented in the CATHOLIC COURIER from week to week. The following article is entitled "Th. Storm Troops.")

Sought West Side Site
A party of discontented parishioners met in the house of a certain Mr. Massey to discuss the possibility of erecting a church on the west side of the Genesee. These eleven men chose Mr. S. Zeug as their representative and sent him to New York to confer with the Bishop. Permission to build this church was given, but on condition that Father Saenderl gave his consent.

At a meeting held later sixty-four men resolved unanimously to build a church on the west side of the river. When operators began trouble arose with Father Saenderl, who did not know that the Bishop had given his conditional consent. When it came time to lay the cornerstone both Father Saenderl and Father O'Reilly refused to perform the ceremony, so the men did it themselves.

Father Saenderl was succeeded by the Rev. Father Benedict Bayer, C.S.S.R. in 1912. He also refused

to recognize the opposition church as canonical and the result was that the Bishop came to Rochester to settle the matter. A Franciscan Father was placed in charge, but resigned his post, owing to the dissension that prevailed between him and the people. During the next three months the Redeemptorists forgot the past and administered to the people who had so strenuously opposed them.

Threatens to Leave
Father Prost knew that the election of these men was the result of an underhand conspiracy and firmly denounced it. He threatened that if another election did not take place he would leave Rochester. It had the desired effect. Another election took place and the men chosen were the very ones whom the opposition had excluded from the previous meeting.

As the days passed Father Prost became sadder and sadder. The majority of his people were becoming indifferent to him. He summoned another Redeemptorist, from Ohio, the Rev. Peter Czackert, and after his arrival, when it became evident the divided congregation would prevent any progress in the building of the church, Father Prost left Rochester, allowing Father Czackert to remain until the following August, 1933.

This drastic measure was intended only as a passing punishment, because deep in his heart he longed for the day that the opposition would be broken and allow his return. Such actually happened.

During the absence of Father Prost the women reproached the men for their conduct, and deplored the fact that once again they were without a priest of their own. The men protested that they had not intended to oppose the pastor and were now willing to make concessions if he would return and endeavor to replace him. They implored him by repeated letters to return to them.

Pastor Arrives
In August, 1933, Father Prost sent the Rev. Simon Saenderl, C.S.S.R. to Rochester to take charge of the flock he had abandoned. This act must have been in God's Design because the very next day after Fr. Saenderl's arrival another priest, the Rev. Clement Hammer came by Bishop Hughes' appointment to take charge. He gracefully withdrew upon finding the Redeemptorist located as pastor.

The people were again happy and love and harmony were the keynote of their existence. This was a brief peace, however, for again it was disturbed in 1934 with the proposal of erecting a new church on Franklin Street. This time it was contention between those who lived on the east side of the river and those on the west. The latter contended that it was too inconvenient for them.

There was also at this time a quivering of opposition to having a Redeemptorist as pastor. A few desired a diocesan priest. The vote that ensued relegated this plan to oblivion as far as the majority were concerned. The minority composed twelve men.

On June 21, 1934, Father Saenderl proceeded with his plans. He purchased a lot next to the land already held by Father Prost. Three months later the trustees
