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**10,000 PARTICIPATE
IN ANNUAL RITES
AT HOLY SEPULCHRE**

In the cathedral-like quiet of Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, surrounding the little stone chapel of All Souls, some 10,000 Catholics assembled Sunday to participate in the annual ceremony of the Blessing of the Graves.

The Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of the Diocese, who officiated and delivered the sermon, was escorted by a double phalanx of clergy, knights and seminarians. These formed a solid pattern of black and white, broken finally by the purple vestments of the Archbishop and prelates.

Men and women stood in the late summer sunlight moving their lips in prayer and small children crowded into the cemetery walls to watch the procession.

Everywhere, the faithful were forgotten in the impressive chant of the vesper, by the seminarians, the simply spoken words of the Archbishop, faintly interrupted by shrill bells, which on Lake Avenue, blocked with traffic.

Speaking in the shadow of the chapel entrance, Archbishop Mooney recalled his own thoughts as he had blessed the souls of the faithful departed. Paying tribute to those who laid the foundation for Catholic faith in this community, he said he thought of the debt owed to the dead to be faithful to the traditions inherited from the past, and he hoped to build up and not dissipate the resources of Christian reverence and faith.

Stressing the responsibility to appreciate the good by the dead for services, the Archbishop said that if the day were to count for more than a sentimental memory, all must pray in the future that God will have mercy on the souls of the faithful departed.

Scholarship recipients, knights of St. John in full uniform, who furnished the military escort were in command of Colonel Frank H. Biel, S.E.C., supreme president of the order.

Members of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's parishes took part in the ceremony.
