## SCHOOL PAYS FINAL TRIBUTE TO BOY ACCIDENT VICTIM

### Youthful Constitution Day Speaker Carried To Grave by Chums

Pupils of St. Peter and Paul School observed Constitution Day in a most fitting manner. The entire school sang "America, the Beautiful." The 4th grade spoke a piece entitled "Flags." Six of the 8th grade spoke on the "Adoption of the Constitution." The entire school sang "The Star-Spangled Banner."

After Irish of the Safety Boys Patrol spoke to the children on Safety Rules and had the boys take their oath of protecting the children of the schools.

One of the boys selected to give the talk on the Constitution was Francis Flaherty. On Saturday evening, Francis with a few of his class mates went for a ride on his bike. As the group was turning from Terry Street into Jefferson Avenue, a car was knocked down by an auto. He was thrown into the air and landed on his head on the sidewalk. Our Francis was rushed to St. Mary's Hospital where he died at 11:30 p.m. His home at 1 o'clock Sunday morning. His mother and dad were with him to the end and the only word he formed on his lips was "Mother"—the sweetest name of all.

Francis was a friend to everybody loved him—boys and girls alike and all proved their loyalty by the glowing tributes paid at home and at church.

From the third grade on he served at the altar. During the summer 23 Masses were served by him—what a wonderful record given to Almighty God.

Every night his classmates wended their way to Francis' home to pray for the repose of his soul. Father Fox and Father Turner, each in turn, accompanied the group of altar boys to the home where prayers were wafted heavenward for their pal and friend.

James Ehmman, Scout Master of the Columbus Youth Association group of which Francis was a member—marked with the scout boys to the home and again offered their eager prayers for his soul.

The funeral took place on Wednesday morning of last week. The entire school lined up double file outside the church. From the center door of the church to the street, the altar boys, the members of his class, and the boy scouts formed a guard of honor.

As a true and loyal altar boy Francis was privileged to be laid out as an altar boy and had eight of his classmates all altar boys as pallbearers.

The altar boys, boy scouts, and the members of his class also accompanied the remains to the cemetery where the prayers said by our Pastor Rev. J. Geffell Ph. D. assisted by the Rev. Father Fox and Rev. Father Turner were offered for the repose of his soul.

As we wended our way homeward, James Ehmman and the scouts knelt in silent prayer.

We will always remember our Francis and will miss him but we know he is safe with God praying for us all. May his soul rest in peace. Amen.

## Catholics In History

Garsigne was an American soldier distinguished for his loyalty to both God and country. During the course of his military career he was ever active in Catholic works. He served with distinction in both the Mexican and the Civil War and met his death on the battlefield.

He attended Georgetown College for four years and then entered the United States Military Academy at West Point. Upon his graduation he received his commission as second lieutenant in the Fourth Artillery. For the next five years he was on duty on the frontier and in garrison. His service in the Mexican War brought him promotion to the rank of captain and an appointment as assistant adjutant-general.

Wherever he was stationed he became prominent in Catholic work. He organized the first local conference of the St. Vincent de Paul Society in Washington, D. C. and served as its first president. He was a contributor to such Catholic magazines as "Brownson's Quarterly Review" and the " Freeman's Journal." In recognition for his services to the Church he was made a Knight of St. Sylvester by Pope Pius IX.

In the Civil War he served with the rank of lieutenant-colonel in the regular army on the staff of General William S. Rosecrans, who subsequently became a convert to the Faith. Participating in the operations of the Army of the Cumberland he was killed by a cannon ball at the battle of Stone River, Tennessee, while leading his troops forward in an effort to turn the tide of battle. He was born near Havana, Cuba, in 1821, and died at Stone River, Tenn., in 1862.
