**Confraternity of Christian Doctrine Reference Reading for Study Club Members**

**THE LIFE OF JESUS LESSON 2**

(A series of eight articles, second of which is presented here, will be printed in the CATHOLIC COURIER to provide supplementary reading for members of diocesan study clubs now engaged in a consideration of "The Life of Jesus." It is suggested by leaders of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine that study club members clip these articles from week to week.)

**THE VISITATION**

When the Spirit of God acts in certain elect souls to the accomplishment of the same end, He draws them towards each other and associates them by an irresistible movement. On the day after that on which Mary was called to be the mother of Jesus, she went straight to the village of Nazareth, chosen, in spite of her age and her barrenness, to be the mother of John the Baptist.

Elizabeth dwelt with her husband, the priest Zacharias, in the mountains of Galilee, in a little spot such as we frequently find in Palestine. The village called Karem, now Ankarim, is situated on a spur of the mountains, which overlooks the Jordan, in a circle of hills. Vineyards, diversified by olive and fig trees, abound, and the fountain which springs up near the village bears their name. On the unbroken line of the horizons are some little fortified watch-towers and many tufts of terebinths and arbutus with their lustrous foliage.

The meeting of these two women, told at length by St. Luke, places in a full light all that was so strange and inspiring in the minor circle in which the great hopes of Israel were beginning to be realized, and wherein God was preparing in secret the salvation of the human race.

Those who share the same sentiment understand each other without words; and the two mothers understood each other at once.

"And it came to pass, that when Elizabeth heard the salutation of Mary, she leaped for joy; and she spake out with a loud voice, and said, Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb. And whence is this to me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me? For, lo, as soon as the voice of thy salutation sounded in mine ears, the babe leaped in my womb for joy, and I have conceived that this child should be called the Son of God."

Then Mary declared to Elizabeth the manner of her own vocation and motherhood.

"And Mary said, My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour. For he hath regarded the lowliness of his handmaid; for, behold, from henceforth all generations shall call me blessed. For he that is mighty hath magnified me; and holy is His name. And his mercy is on them that fear Him throughout all generations. He hath showed strength with his arm; he hath scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts. He hath put down the mighty from their seat, and he hath exalted the lowly. He hath filled the hungry with good things; and the rich he hath sent empty away. He hath helped his servant Israel, in remembrance of his covenant; as he spake to our fathers, to Abraham, and to his seed for ever."

Poetry is the language of strong impressions and lofty ideas; among the Jews, as among all Eastern nations, it was full of inspiration; every soul is poetic, and sings in joy or sorrow. If ever a full heart gave vent to an inspired hymn, it was the heart of the maiden elect by God to be the mother of the Messiah. Not thus speaks any mere woman, a daughter of Eve; this inspired canticle overpassed all earthly bounds, and closed the cycle of the older days; it was no longer hope which called upon God, but triumphant faith which saw, and possessed him; it was the hymn of the new age, the most splendid cry of joy which ever sprang from a human breast.

The shade of Mary at Karem, in the house of Zacharias, lasted for three months. It was one long prayer, one uninterrupted confidence.

**DIOCESE HAS DELEGATION AT N. Y. MEET**

**Leaders In Confraternity Work Here at Catechetical Congress**

The Diocese of Rochester was well represented at the Catechetical Congress sponsored by the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and held in New York first part of the week.

Participating in religious ceremonies and presiding at a session Monday was the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester.

Papers were read at the sessions by the Rev. John M. Duffy, diocesan director of the Confraternity and the Rev. Dr. Joseph Bairot of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Also attending were: The Rev. Leo C. Mooney, diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith; the Rev. Charles J. Mahoney, associate pastor of the schools; the Rev. Joseph V. Curtin of Clyde; the Rev. Donald Cleary, Chaplain at Cornell University; and Miss Helen R. Gantner of the diocesan school office.

Representatives of Sisters of St. Joseph, Mercy and Notre Dame from this diocese were present.

**State AOH Leader From Here Guest At Albany Fete**

State Secretary Martin K. Fenelon of this city was among high officials of the Ancient Order of Hibernians attending a dinner at Hotel Ten Eyck, Saturday evening, celebrating the 40th anniversary of the Albany organization and the centennial of the order in the United States.

Greeting from Eamon De Valera, president of the Irish Free State, were brought to the guests by the Rev. Michael J. Dwyer, pastor of St. Ambrose Church, Lathama, who returned from Ireland last week after a personal audience with the head of the Irish government.

Principal address was given by Nicholas J. Barry, Albany attorney who traces the origin and development of the Hibernian movement during the last century.

Other prominent guests present were: William J. Ryan, national treasurer; John J. Walsh, state president; William J. Twomey, state organizer; James Purcell, state director; and Miss Veronica McCull, state president of the women's auxiliary, and Mrs. James Kiasano, state secretary.


While these uncertain rumours passed from village to village, the work of God continued about the cradle of John His father too was carried away by the ancient spirit of the prophets, he in part discovered the mystery of which Mary Nazareth carried in her bosom the ineffable secret, he had a perfect consciousness of the vocation of his son, he understood that all God had announced by the mouth of his saints and prophets from eternity was now accomplished.

**THE RETURN TO NAZARETH**

The Gospels imply that Mary was not present at the birth of John and the feast of his circumcision; for it is only after his mention of her return to Nazareth that St. Luke narrates the event of which the house of Zacharias was the scene, and there is nothing to disclose even to suggest her presence. The Virgin was as yet only betrothed; the ceremony of her reception into the home of her husband had not yet been celebrated; the time for the family gathering was drawing on; and she returned to Nazareth.
