STANDARD BEARERS SET AS COLUMBUS DAY RITES NEAR

One of the most colorful ceremonies of the school year takes place at the Columbus Day Centre Monday at the annual Columbus Day flag transfer in the auditorium.

Old standard bearers from 37 primary schools and Aquinas Institute will transfer the school flags to the newly-selected standard bearers.

Program Arranged The program for the day will be under the direction of Captain John Arthur Jennings, president of the Rochester State Society. The Rev. John M. Duffy, diocesan school superintendent is supervising arrangements.

With the Rev. Charles J. Brunton presiding the program will open with the singing of "America." Then will come recitations of the Gettysburg Address and one on the Constitution.

In accordance with a resolution passed by Congress in 1934, the President of the United States recently issued his proclamation calling upon the nation to observe the 44th anniversary of the discovery of the New World.

President Roosevelt says "The President of the United States is authorized and requested to issue a proclamation designating October 12 of each year as Columbus Day and calling upon officials of the government, officials of the schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies expressive of the public sentiment of the anniversary of the discovery of America."

"Now, therefore, I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, under and by the authority vested in me by this proclamation designate October 12, 1936, as Columbus Day and do direct that on that day a flag of the United States be displayed on all government buildings; and further, I do invite the people of the United States to observe the day with appropriate ceremonies in schools and churches or other suitable places. In Witness Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed."

What may prove to be an interesting relic of Columbus and his voyage is reported to have been discovered recently in the archives of the Karpodol Museum in North Russia, according to a limited Press dispatch. It is believed to be a diary written by Columbus himself, recounting various events in his voyage. The book is bound in parchment with a design of shells and weeds around a seal suspended by a long string. The text is reported, describes Columbus' journeys and is profusely illustrated.

Catholics in History

William Russell Grace was an American philanthropist and merchant whose life was a practical exemplification of Catholic principles. He was the first Catholic to be elected mayor of the city of New York, founder of a large international mercantile establishment and a liberal contributor to philanthropic enterprises.

Born in Ireland he went to Paris, South America, with his father. His father later returned to Ireland but he remained, becoming a partner with the firm of John Bryce at Calais. This firm was later known as Grace Brothers & Company, having offices in New York, San Francisco, and in all the leading cities on the west coast of South America.

Taking up his residence in Brooklyn and then in New York he established the New York and Pacific Steamship Company and other business enterprises. He contributed one-fourth of the cargo of provisions that was sent to Ireland during the great famine of 1876 and 1878. He was subsequently elected mayor of New York and re-elected for a second term. He refused to be a candidate for a third term.

His principal charitable undertaking was the establishment of the Grace Institute in New York, which was placed in charge of the Sisters of Charity. He was prompted to undertake this work by his study of economic conditions among employees in one of his enterprises. The institution gave free tuition to women in dressmaking, stenography, typewriting, bookkeeping, and domestic science. It also assisted the poor generally. William Russell Grace was born in Cork, Ireland, in 1832, and died at New York in 1904.

Unique 'Glass House School' Adds Two Units

ALBANY N. Y. Two new units have been added to the "glass house" school of the Vincentian Institute, Child Care Division, here. The school, which is said to be the only one of its kind in the country, is exposed to the sun by means of a special grade of glass which transmits the curative and healthful rays. The children wear and use sleeveless uniform and sun glasses.

The addition of the new units increases the accommodations of the school to 300 pupils. The school, originally housed in a conservatory, included the kindergarten and first and second grades. The addition of the two new units brings the school curriculum up to the fourth grade.

The faculty of the school is made up of Sisters of Mercy.

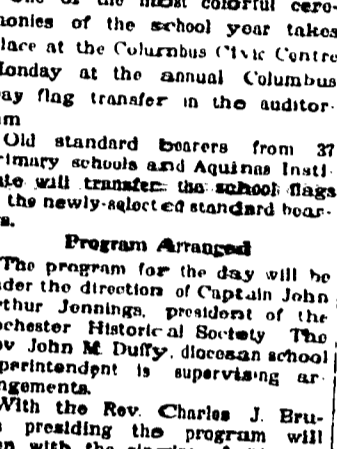

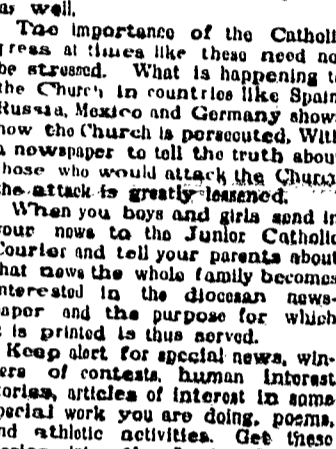
