The necessary orders to police that the priest must not be held. Efforts were then made to switch the priest to the suburbs. Westmount, but organizers were informed there was "no hall available" there.

More than 800 students marched however, to the town to make sure the priest was being kept. Unable to get a hall here the Spanish delegation left for New York the same evening.

Prior to the arrival in Montreal at noon, the following statement was published with the authority of the Chancellor of the Diocese of Montreal.

"The Rev. Louis Saracole, who it would appear is to speak in Montreal one of these days, has not presented to the Archbishop's residence at Montreal his letters of credentials from his legitimate Superior, nor any documents which would permit him to say Mass, as he is obliged to do by Canon Law and diocesan regulations.

"Besides, he seems to be according to press reports, to take an attitude contrary to the solemn declarations of the Sovereign Pontiff a few days ago, and to that of certain Bishops of Spain on the same occasion now transpiring there.

"We therefore place our Catholics on guard against the statements which he may make."

TORONTO (NC) — Representatives of the Canadian League Against War and Fascism, sponsoring the tour of Canada of the former Spanish Franciscan priest, Luis Saracole, have refused to permit him to be seen or interviewed privately by the Catholic Press. It is stated in The Catholic Register of this city. He was brought to the United States to speak on the occasion of the government of Madrid, which is in the control of the radicals.

The Catholic newspaper tells of an effort on the part of one of the members of its editorial staff and the representative of another Catholic publication to speak with the former priest.

Catholic interviewers presented their request for a private conversation. It was stated, A. A. McLeod, secretary of the Canadian League Against War and Fascism, at first agreed to permit the interview and then refused to allow him to be seen privately. "It had evidently become of the utmost importance," The Catholic Register said, "that Father Saracole should not be permitted to see any Catholics except in the presence of the rest of the delegation."

The representative of The Catholic Register, the paper announced, protested before the same delegation that "Father Saracole was not a free man; he had first been imprisoned by the Spanish Government and he was still a prisoner in the custody of those who controlled the delegation."

The paper stated that the effort to see the former priest privately was made purely in his own interest, not to obtain any information from him but to provide him with it.

At a general press conference a telegram from the Franciscan Provincial in New York was read and translated to Father Saracole. It said: "Luis Saracole is an apostate Franciscan forbidden to exercise priestly function by Rome."

TELLS STORY OF SUFFERING IN ALCAZAR

LONDON (NC) — A vivid account of the siege of the Alcazar is contained in a dispatch published in The Catholic Herald, of this city, from its correspondent in Spain, who was one of the first civilians to enter Toledo after its capture and the relief of the famous fortress.

"I arrived in Toledo on the morning following the capture of the town and the relief of the Alcazar was courteously received by Nationalist officials who gave me the fullest particulars of the relief of the fortress and provided guides to show me over the ruins."

"It is estimated that 12,000 bombs fell on the Alcazar and of those men who so heroically defended it 80 were killed, 500 wounded, and 400 untouched. The rest were women and children."

Many Bombs Unexploded
The presence of unexploded bombs among the ruins made any tour of inspection a serious adventure. A few walls of the fortress were still standing but the interior was a mass of stones, shattered masonry, broken glass, furniture, torn mattresses, old books, and twisted pieces of iron.

"My two guides had themselves been in the Alcazar during the entire siege. One of them was the son of the Governor of Toledo. The other nine weeks have been like a bad dream," they told me. Their drawn, emaciated faces were sufficient evidence of the terror and privation they must have suffered.

"When my eyes grew used to the dark I saw a statue of Our Lady resting in a corner. It was in front of the altar. The statue had been rescued from the ruins twice a day. I could imagine the anguished voices rising from the darkness. It was only a coarse plaster statue moved from its place to another according to the state of the siege. It was never hit."

Atrocities in Toledo
The correspondent received many first-hand accounts of atrocities committed during the time when the city was under the control of the Loyalists. Convents were attacked and many were converted into barracks. Churches and the homes of all known Catholics were pillaged. Those who were condemned to death were first driven through the streets and exposed to the fury of the mob.

When a bomb was dropped on a Government building, the correspondent was told, the Loyalists rejoyiced themselves by executing 90 prisoners.

**Duce Emphasizes
Settlement of
Roman Question**

VATICAN CITY (NC-CABLE) — The great importance of the settlement of the so-called Roman Question was emphasized by Premier Benito Mussolini in summarizing developments of the last ten years in an address at Bologna on Saturday.

Referring to the conciliation, Premier Mussolini said: "The period from 1926 to 1929 may be called a period of conciliation. The great event of February 11, 1929, sealed the peace between the Church and State. It was a problem that weighed on the conscience of the nation for 60 years. Fascism resolved it. All those who cast dark prophecies on the future remained mortified and humiliated. It is of exceptional importance in the life of the people that the State and Church be reconciled in the individual and collective conscience of the whole nation."

"Unless very definite steps are taken and very determined efforts are put forth to restore the Christian family to the position of dignity and honor that was its glory in the past, other efforts in the field of Catholic Action will prove of little avail." NEW MARTYRDOMS REVEAL SAVAGE SPANISH TORTURE

Sick Priest Shot to Death
Crying 'Viva, Christ
The King'

Vatican City Further details concerning specific instances of savage attacks upon the persons of Catholic religious in Spain and of the wanton destruction of property belonging to religious communities have reached Rome.

In the current disorders in Spain the Capuchin monasteries of Sarria, Olot, Manresa, Igualada, Aranya, de Mar, Borja and Blanca have been sacked, burned and completely destroyed. Convents in Barcelona and Tarragona were sacked and then occupied as hospitals and as the headquarters of anarchical groups.

The first Capuchin killed in Manresa was Father Oriol from Barcelona. His executioners after having torn his head from his body, forced him to blaspheme. He died in the arms of his fellow monks.

Another priest, Father Guardino Benito of Santa Coloma was shot in Manresa.

Blind Brother Killed
In Arens de Mar, Father Benito, a blind brother, was shot. In Sarria, Fathers Fermín, Rafael, Vicente, Inapert, Raphael, Damato, Augustino, Damato, Brother Marcel, a student, and Father Angelo Diferencia, a lay brother, were killed.

In Barcelona, four brothers were beaten to death with the stocks of the Alcazar. The brothers were: Michael Savanya, Brother George Dasantapur, Brother Edoardo Viana and Brother Cyprian Dataras.

In Tarragona, Father Alphonse Mary Dager, a 70-year-old missionary was slain. Brother Four Datorrosa was killed in another quarter.

Harsh suffering in the face of atrocious torment is also recorded of a number of members of the secular clergy in these latest reports. In Olot, Father Ferrer, a teacher of music, was stripped of his clothing. His clothes were then saturated with benzine and placed beneath his feet. He was burned alive. Father Miralpeix, a serious illness, was forced by a Communist doctor to get out of bed and to present himself to the People's Committee. The priest replied to questions by exclaiming "Viva, Christ the King." He was shot.

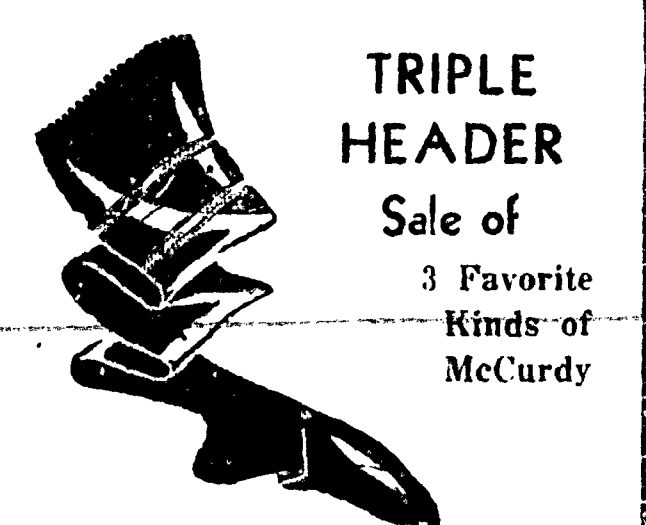
