Catholics In History
RAPHAEL SEMMES
 Raphael Semmes was the leading naval officer of the Confederacy during the Civil War. He was not with the South upon the outbreak of the war due to his citizenship in Alabama. His success in operating against the merchant fleet of the Union was such that although he was pardoned under the general amnesty proclamation of President Johnson, his political disabilities were never removed.
 He was a descendant of a family among the original Catholic Colonists of Maryland. He became a shipman in the navy and served in this capacity for six years after which he was granted extended leave and took up the practice of law. Returning to the navy he attained the rank of commander. He resigned upon the outbreak of the war.
 Appointed commander then captain and finally rear admiral in the Confederate navy, he destroyed in a period of six months 18 northern ships and was commander of the privateer Sumter. Subsequently, in command of the Alabama he captured 69 northern vessels inflicting a terrible blow upon the sea-carrying trade of the United States. When the Alabama was finally sunk by the Kearsarge off the coast of France he escaped to England, returned to the South and assisted in the defense of Richmond.
 Following the war he took up the practice of law in Mobile, Alabama, edited a paper and was for a time professor in the Louisiana Military Institute. He was the author of "Service Afloat and Ashore During the Mexican War," "The Campaign of General Scott in the Valley of Mexico," "The Cruise of the Alabama and Sumter," and "Memoirs of Services Afloat during the War between the States."
 He was born in Charles County Maryland, in 1809 and died at Point Clear, Alabama, in 1877.
