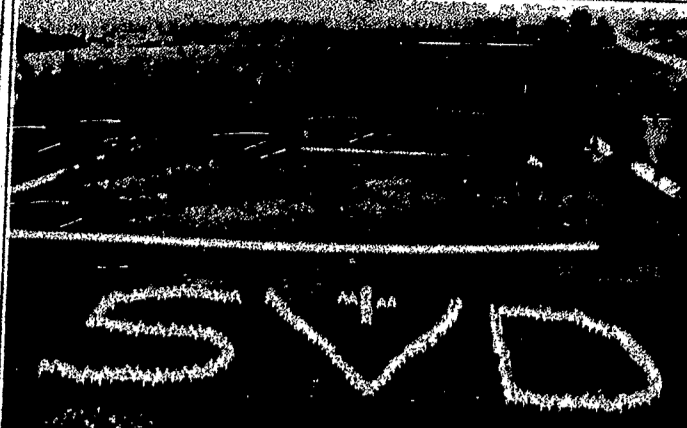

The return to work was preceded by special prayers in the Mosques and Christian Churches, after which shutters were taken down and normal life was resumed.

THE LIFE OF JESUS LESSON 6

A series of eight articles, of which the first has been published in the CATHOLIC COURIER, will be for members of diocesan study clubs now engaged in a consideration of "The Life of Jesus." It is suggested by leaders of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine that study club members clip these articles from week to week.

JESUS RETURNS TO NAZARETH

The Gospel documents do not define the villages and towns of Galilee, to which he went preaching the good news of the Kingdom of God. St. Luke, however, tells us in detail of a journey which he made to Nazareth at this time, and gives an animated narrative which brings before us a scene in a Jewish synagogue, and gives us the nature of His Kingdom.

"It would seem that Jesus had not returned to his own country since the day when he had quitted it, in going to the Jordan to be baptized by John. He would not return to the town where the Gospel up in obscurity, and consecrated to the first-fruits of His Galilean apostolate.

"On the Sabbath day He came, as usual, to the synagogue, where so often He had been seen, seated in silence, in the lower places, and distinguished among his countrymen, listening to the reading of the Law, and the commentaries of the doctors, and the elders. The unknown workman now reappeared with the renown of a prophet, and he drew all eyes upon Him. He was the little town must have been impatient to verify all that was told of Him, and the rulers of the synagogue must have regarded Him with a certain arrogance, and limited knowledge of the doctor, ill to receive the words of an unlettered artisan, who had never been at school, had no Greek, and openly broke with their customs.

"After the recitation of the Law, Jesus was honored by being asked to read a passage from the Prophets. At the order of the president, the Haasan offered Him the sacred roll. He opened it, and found the following passage from the Prophet Isaiah: 'The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, and He hath anointed me to preach good tidings unto the meek; He hath sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound; to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all that mourn; to mourn in Zion, to give unto them beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness; that they might be called trees of unrighteousness, that the might be planted in this day fulfilled.' People questioned.

"Jesus explained to the people of Nazareth that it was He on whom the Spirit of the Lord had descended in the virtue of this divine union. He was the Messiah, the Son of God; and He taught the nature of this Kingdom as Isaiah had prophesied it.

"As soon as the first excitement died away, an objection sprang up in the minds of a great number. Jesus had clearly declared Himself the Messiah; it was asked by what right He dared to claim this title, and His humble birth was remembered with disdain: 'Is not this, they said, the son of Joseph?' "Opposition grew warmer; and He was pressed in an offended tone for the signs upon which He founded such high pretensions. Impartial reasons remain calm, but minds whose preconceived ideas were wounded are not impartial. At that time fanaticism was almost universal among the Jews; they demanded signs, and excited these from Jesus, as a justification of His claims as Messiah. Jesus refused them to the Nazarenes, as He always refused them to those who demanded them in a like spirit of hostility. He gave them only to those who had faith, never to those who discussed with pride and ill temper. This is a remarkable fact in His whole life, and a characteristic feature of His conduct. But He had already been accompanied at Jerusalem by Jesus and St. Capernaum, and it was His right to rely on them before his fellow-townsmen, who were scandalized.
