## Elmira Priest Named To Catholic Prison Chaplains' New Board

Failure To Give Religion Proper Place In Program Of Correction Cited at National Institute Of Clergymen of All Churches

WASHINGTON—Formation of an Association of Catholic Prison Chaplains was announced here Thursday at the closing session of the first Institute for Prison Chaplains, sponsored by the Catholic Unity of America School of Social Work.

On an executive committee of four widely known Catholic chaplains was appointed the Rev. Francis L. Lane, Catholic Chaplain of the State Reformatory at Elmira, N. Y.

At the same time, there was made public on behalf of the chaplain who had attended the Institute, a statement which charges that "one of the crying mistakes of the whole American penal system has been the purely casual attention it has given to religion."

The statement also says that "leaders in the field of penalology are coming to recognize more and more clearly that religion must have a very important place in any program for the prevention and treatment of crime;" that "chaplains now have good reasons for believing that they will be given better opportunity for the exercise of their religious ministry" that "the prison chaplain should not be burdened with other responsibilities inside or outside the prison;" that "the prison chaplain cannot carry out his work in isolation" but "needs special preparation just as much as any other person in the whole field of penology;" that "the Catholic chaplain needs the full support and cooperation of diocesan organizations of Catholic Charities."

38 Catholic Chaplains

Catholic chaplains from 38 Federal and State penal institutions attended the Institute and joined in the statement.

No officers have yet been chosen for the newly formed Association. For the present a committee of administration are left in the hands of an executive committee composed of the Rt. Rev. Major John O'Grady, Dean of the Catholic University School of Social Work, Chairman; the Rev. Joseph J. Dowling, Catholic Chaplain at Washington Penitentiary, Lawburg, Pa.; Father Lane; and the Rev. John P. Farrell, Catholic Chaplain at the State Reformatory at Elmira, N. Y.

Edward F. Mulrooney, former Police Commissioner of New York City and now Director of the Department of Correction of the State of New York, was the principal speaker at the Institute, the session with which the Institute was brought to a close last evening. He declared that "lack of parental and religious control is the grave weakness in the entire crime problem today."

Diagnosed by Law

Commissioner Mulrooney told the chaplains that these objectives are splendid and that they are engaged in a service that is very much worthwhile. The Commissioner, saying "we all know that crime flows from delinquency," cited the

**FOUR YEARS' WAIT**  
**Bishop Asks Aid for Unfinished School**  
Bishop Francis David is the Chalcedon Bishop of Amadia in Iraq. Before the war he was in Mesopotamia. If you will look at the map of Asia Minor, you will find Syria. East of Syria you will come to Iraq. Here is a school that we received from the Bishop a short time ago.

"In the village of Inckel, we have an elementary school where we try to give our children a Catholic education and save them from the dangers that surround them. This school is at present in quarters that we rent by the month. To pay this rent is a terrific burden. The building that we rent is small and not at all accommodated to a school.

"For the last four years, I have been trying to build. At the present time, I have gathered all the material necessary to put up this building, and we have commenced in a small way the construction. However, we will be forced to stop within a few weeks, because I have not the money to continue. We are surrounded by Mohammedans and Protestants who seem to have a great supply of money. If our children go to the Mohammedan schools, they will lose the Faith. If they go to the Protestant schools, they will be without any religion at all short time, so you can see why I am worried and sick because of our condition.

"\$250.00 will cover all my necessary expenses. Perhaps you think that I ought to be able to raise \$250.00. Our people here are not only poor, but they are without even the very necessities of life. They are Christians, and because they are Christians they are shut off from all the good positions in the country. Please do not abandon me now, stop everything you can to collect this \$250.00 for me."

Anybody reading this letter from this aged Bishop must certainly realize that he is worthy of help. Iraq has a population of over three million people. Less than one hundred thousand are Christians. The Mohammedans own everything. It is a Mohammedan Government, and strongly against everything Christian. Will somebody answer this appeal? We hope so. Perhaps you cannot send a check for the full amount, then, at least, send us what you can afford.

The Columbian Scouts organization is internationally sponsored by the Knights of Columbus and seeks to supplement the work of Church, home and school in providing a wholesome and constructive leisure-time program for the boys, as they "grow out" of younger programs.
